Django App Shell Documentation

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Django App Shell

Inspired by the Using Django with service workers talk by Adrian Holovaty from the DjangoCon Europe 2016, django-app-shell aims to provide an easy to use and configure way of utilizing the app shell architecture from google.

Documentation

Quickstart

Install Django App Shell:

```
pip install django-app-shell
```

Add it to your INSTALLED_APPS:

```
INSTALLED_APPS = (
    ...
    'django_app_shell.apps.DjangoAppShellConfig',
    ...
)
```

Add Django App Shell's URL patterns:

```
from django_app_shell import urls as django_app_shell_urls

urlpatterns = [
    ...
    url(r'^', include(django_app_shell_urls)),
    ...
]
```

Features

- client side caching using service worker (TODO)
- easy push notification API (TODO)
- offline use of page/features using service worker (TODO)

Running Tests

Does the code actually work?

```
source <YOURVIRTUALENV>/bin/activate
(myenv) $ pip install tox
(myenv) $ tox
```

- Cookiecutter
- cookiecutter-djangopackage

Installation

At the command line:

\$ easy_install django-app-shell

Or, if you have virtualenvwrapper installed:

\$ mkvirtualenv django-app-shell \$ pip install django-app-shell

Usage

To use Django App Shell in a project, add it to your INSTALLED_APPS:

```
INSTALLED_APPS = (
    ...
    'django_app_shell.apps.DjangoAppShellConfig',
    ...
)
```

Add Django App Shell's URL patterns:

```
from django_app_shell import urls as django_app_shell_urls

urlpatterns = [
    ...
    url(r'^', include(django_app_shell_urls)),
    ...
]
```

Types of Contributions

Report Bugs

Report bugs at https://github.com/DebVortex/django-app-shell/issues.

If you are reporting a bug, please include:

- Your operating system name and version.
- Any details about your local setup that might be helpful in troubleshooting.
- Detailed steps to reproduce the bug.

Fix Bugs

Look through the GitHub issues for bugs. Anything tagged with "bug" is open to whoever wants to implement it.

Implement Features

Look through the GitHub issues for features. Anything tagged with "feature" is open to whoever wants to implement it.

Write Documentation

Django App Shell could always use more documentation, whether as part of the official Django App Shell docs, in docstrings, or even on the web in blog posts, articles, and such.

Submit Feedback

The best way to send feedback is to file an issue at https://github.com/DebVortex/django-app-shell/issues.

If you are proposing a feature:

- Explain in detail how it would work.
- Keep the scope as narrow as possible, to make it easier to implement.
- Remember that this is a volunteer-driven project, and that contributions are welcome:)

Get Started!

Ready to contribute? Here's how to set up django-app-shell for local development.

- 1. Fork the *django-app-shell* repo on GitHub.
- 2. Clone your fork locally:

```
$ git clone git@github.com:your_name_here/django-app-shell.git
```

3. Install your local copy into a virtualenv. Assuming you have virtualenvwrapper installed, this is how you set up your fork for local development:

```
$ mkvirtualenv django-app-shell
$ cd django-app-shell/
$ python setup.py develop
```

4. Create a branch for local development:

```
$ git checkout -b name-of-your-bugfix-or-feature
```

Now you can make your changes locally.

5. When you're done making changes, check that your changes pass flake8 and the tests, including testing other Python versions with tox:

```
$ flake8 django_app_shell tests
$ python setup.py test
$ tox
```

To get flake8 and tox, just pip install them into your virtualenv.

6. Commit your changes and push your branch to GitHub:

```
$ git add .
$ git commit -m "Your detailed description of your changes."
$ git push origin name-of-your-bugfix-or-feature
```

7. Submit a pull request through the GitHub website.

Pull Request Guidelines

Before you submit a pull request, check that it meets these guidelines:

- 1. The pull request should include tests.
- 2. If the pull request adds functionality, the docs should be updated. Put your new functionality into a function with a docstring, and add the feature to the list in README.rst.
- 3. The pull request should work for Python 2.6, 2.7, and 3.3, and for PyPy. Check https://travis-ci.org/DebVortex/django-app-shell/pull_requests and make sure that the tests pass for all supported Python versions.

Tips

To run a subset of tests:

\$ python -m unittest tests.test_django_app_shell
