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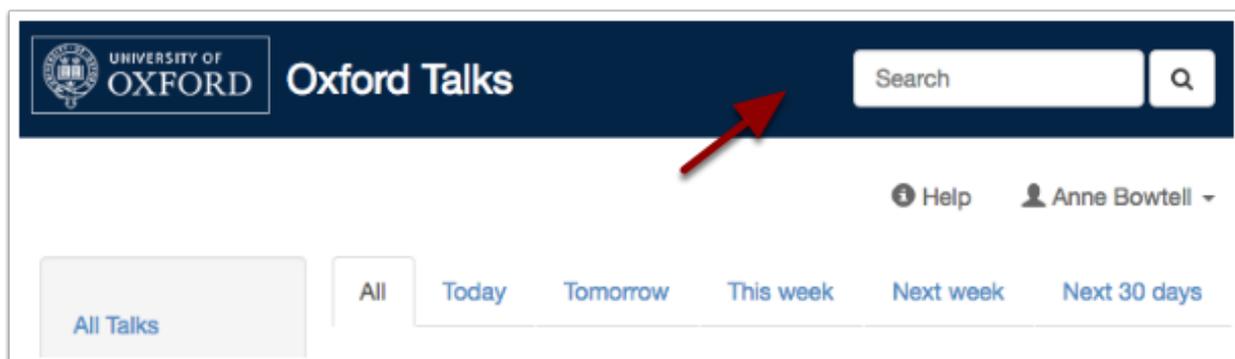
## Explore Oxford Talks

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An introduction to Oxford Talks

### Browse and Search

Today's talks are always displayed on the Home Page of Oxford Talks. Don't forget you can use the **Search** box if you're looking for something specific.



### View upcoming talks

The Home Page will show you all talks for the next 30 days - you can use the tabs to see tomorrow's or next week's talks. If you're looking for talks in a particular time-frame, use the date filters on the filter panel to adjust this.

1. Click the calendar icon on the **Start Date** or **End Date** filters to set the date
2. If you want to see all the upcoming talks, use the **clear** button on the **End Date** filter
3. Click **Submit** at the bottom of the filter panel

## Find a seminar series

If you are interested in a particular seminar series, or meetings of a society:

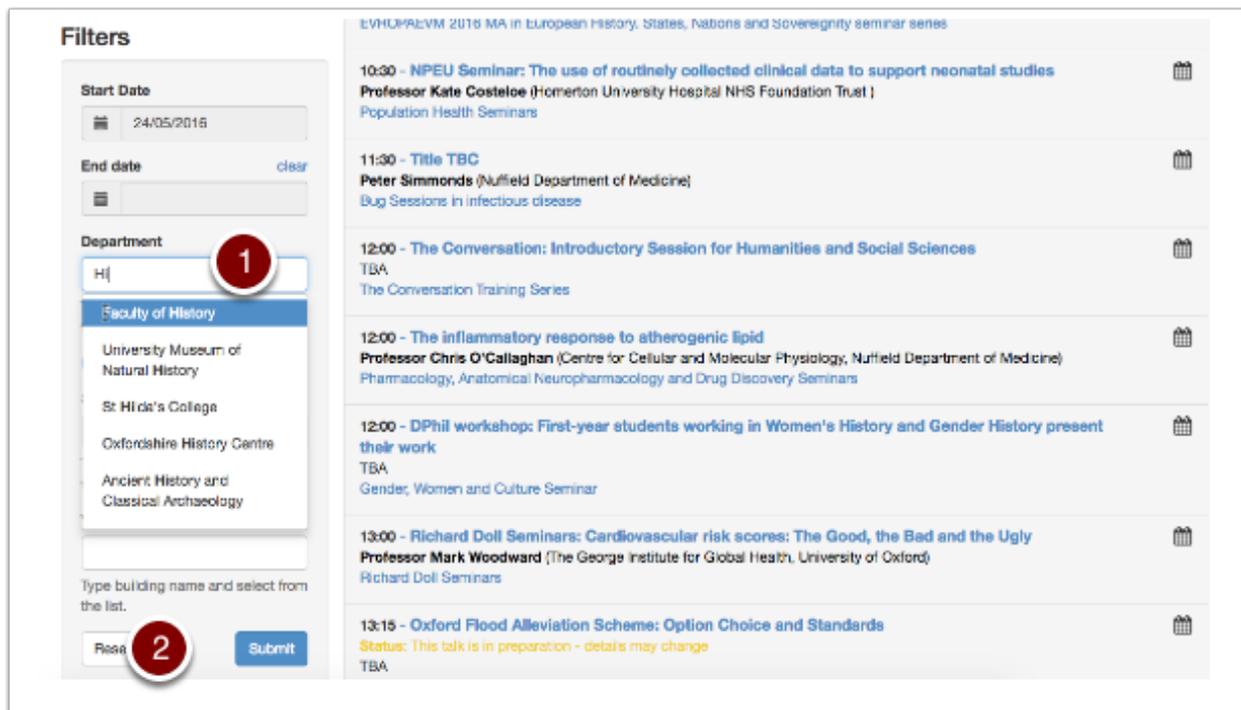
- Use the **Series** box in the filter panel if you know the name of the series you are interested in
- Alternatively, browse the full list of **Lecture/Seminar Series** using the link from the left hand panel



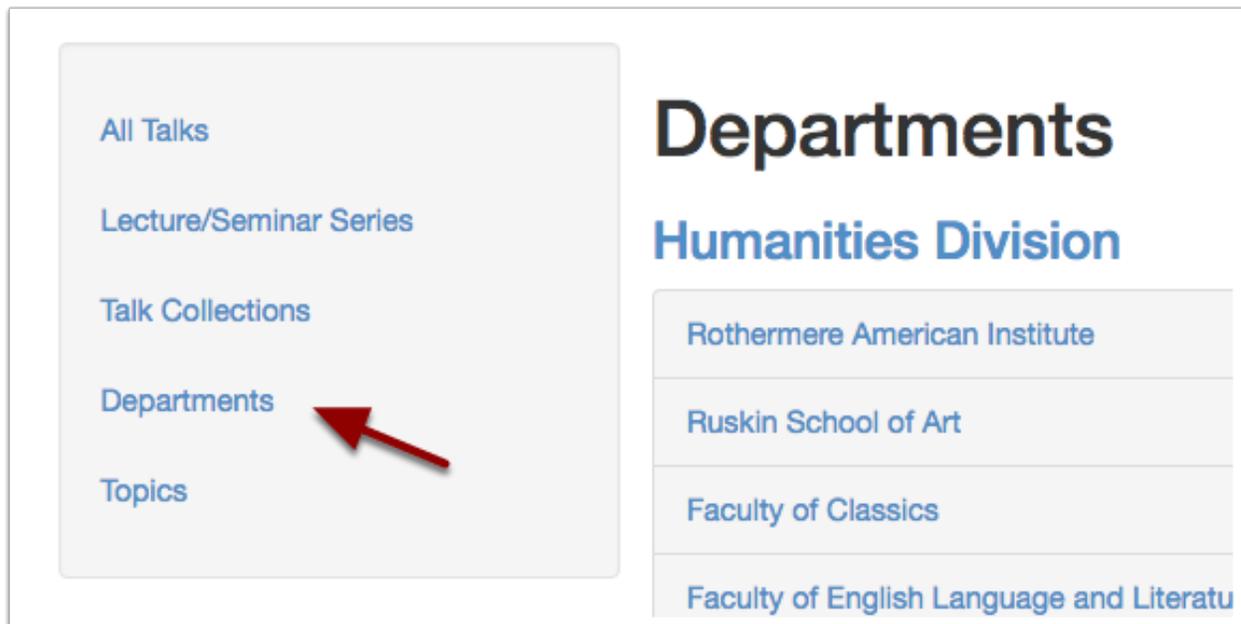
## See my department's talks

To see all upcoming talks happening in your department:

1. Start typing into the **Department** box on the filter panel. You don't need to type the full name (for instance, 'HI' will find the Faculty of History, acronyms like 'DPAG' will also work)
2. Remember to click **Submit**



Alternatively use the **Departments** link on the Home Page, this will take you to a listing of the main University departments, listed by Division.



## Discover talks on an interesting topic

It's also possible to find talks on a on a particular topic - you don't need to know the series talk belongs to or the organising department - there are two ways to do this:

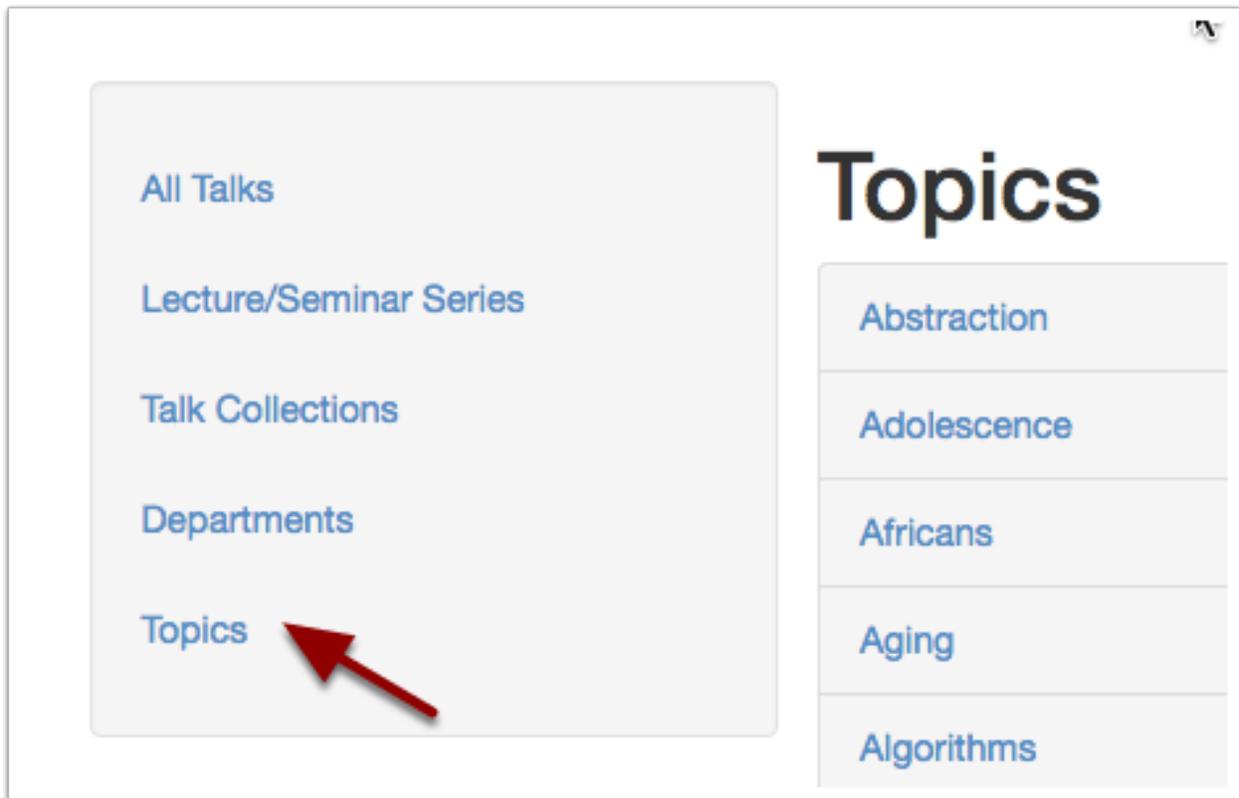
### Public Collections

- Click **Talk Collections** in the left hand panel to see collections of talks made by other people

### Topics

Talks Editors are also beginning to tag talks with a huge range of topics (based on the Library of Congress subject headings).

- Click **Topics** in the left hand panel to see the topics currently in use (this page can take a little time to load)



- All the topics assigned to a talk or series are clickable, so you can also explore a topic further from an individual talk

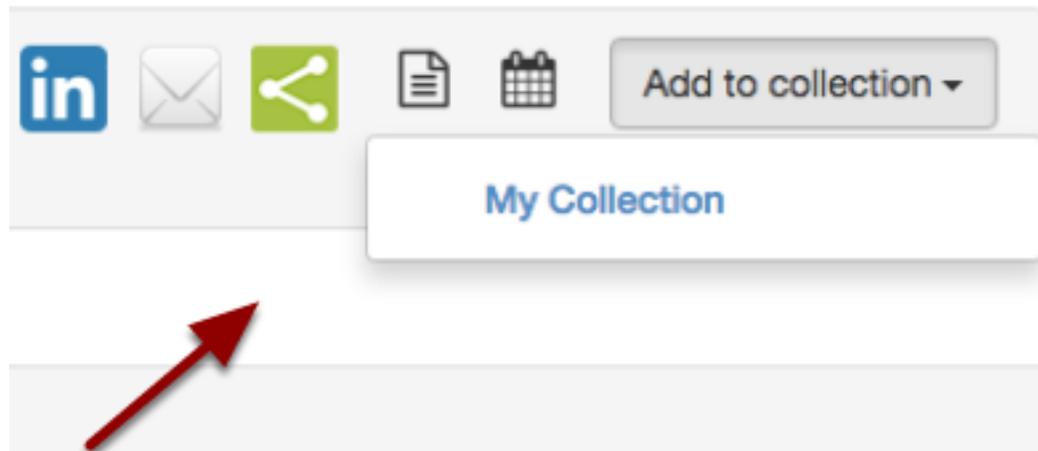

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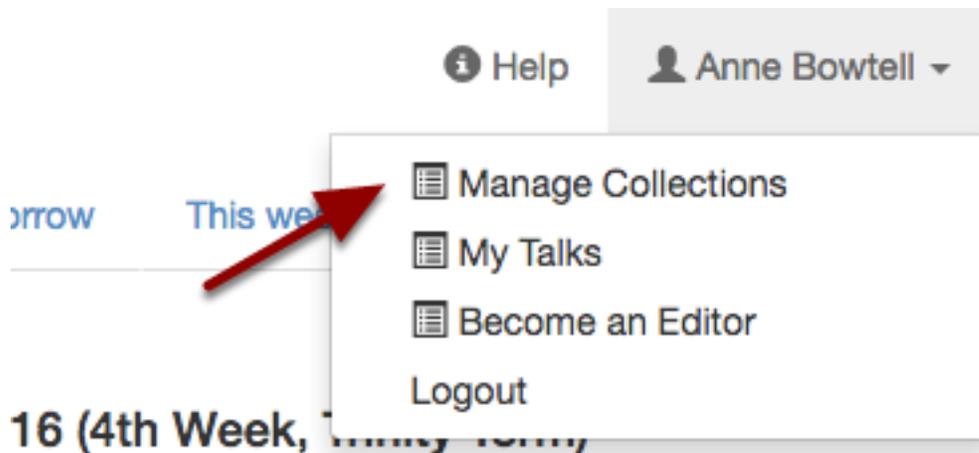
### Add talks to My Collection

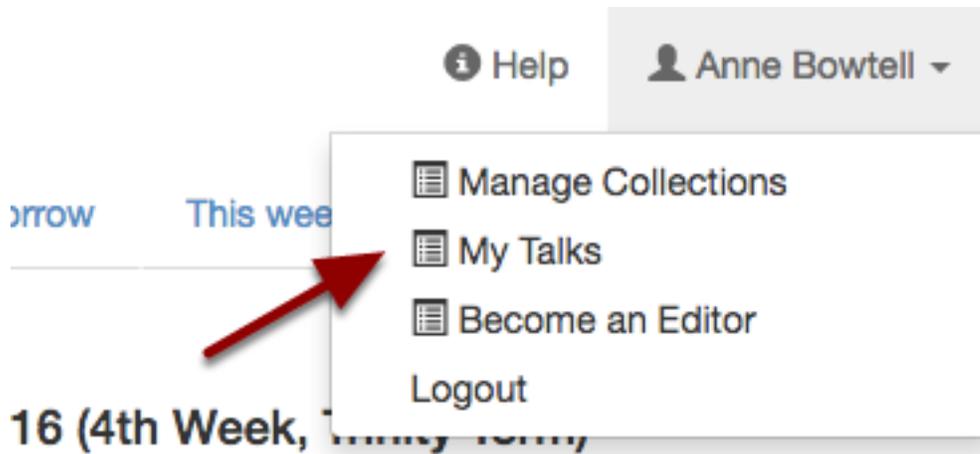

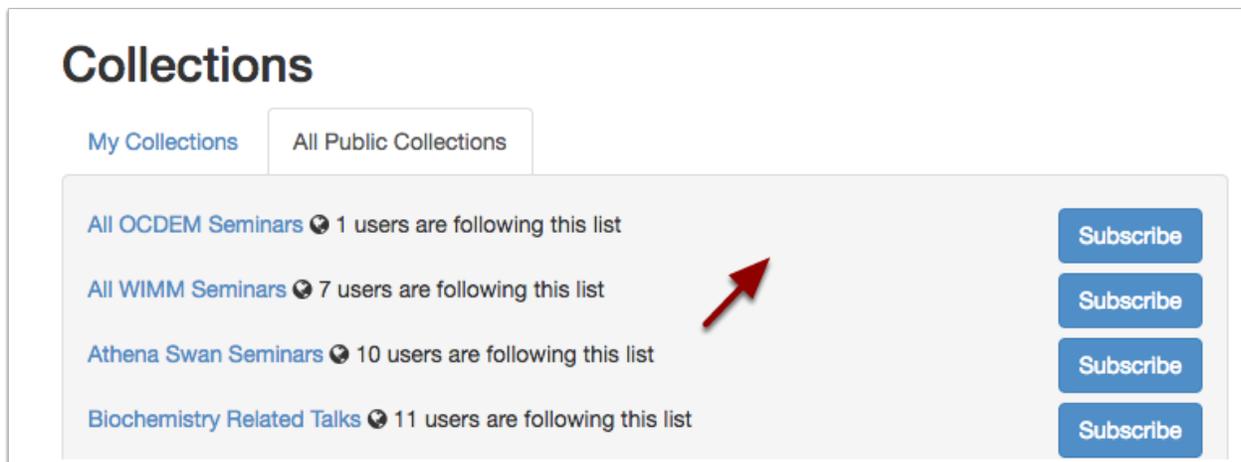

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## Copy talks to your own calendar

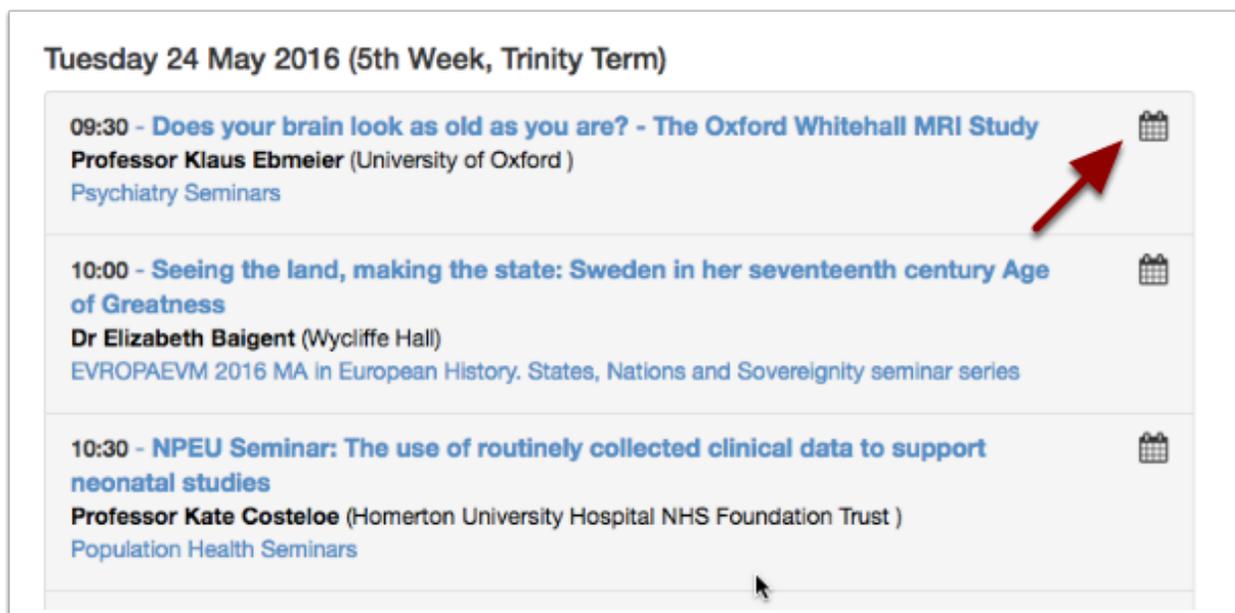
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You can put the details of any talk into your Nexus, Google or iCloud calendar. How this works depends on the browser and calendar you are using; we've covered some of the standard combinations here. The following steps will work for either a single talk or a series of talks.

**Note:** Using this method, if the talk information changes in any way, the information in your own calendar **won't update automatically**. You should always check Oxford Talks to make sure that the time or location hasn't changed since you added the talk to your calendar.

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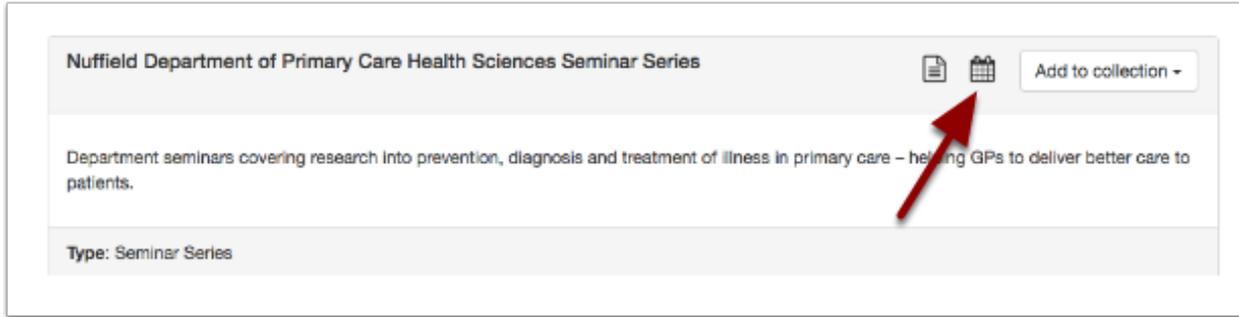
### Find the Add to Calendar link

- For a single talk, click on the **calendar icon** next to any talk



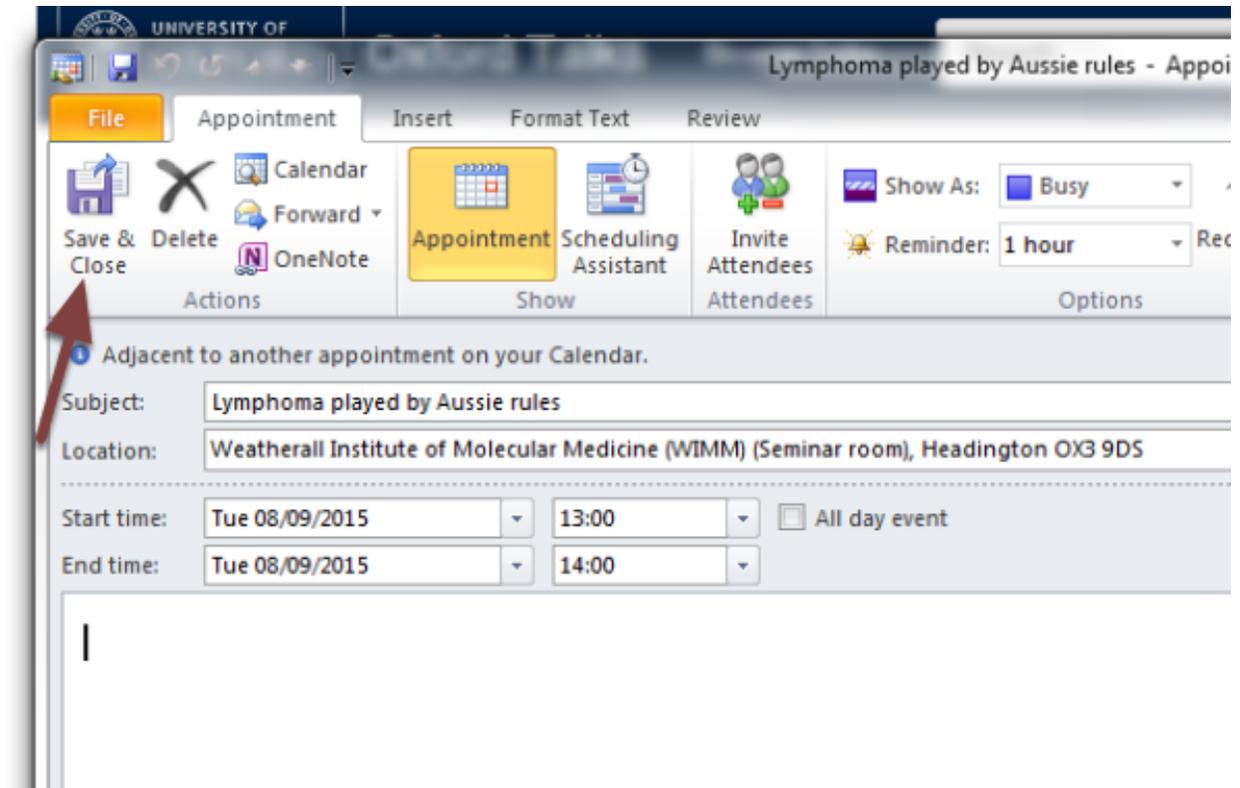
- For a series of talks, use the **Add to your calendar** button

The next steps depend on which combination of browser and calendar you are using:

## Using Internet Explorer and Outlook (PC)

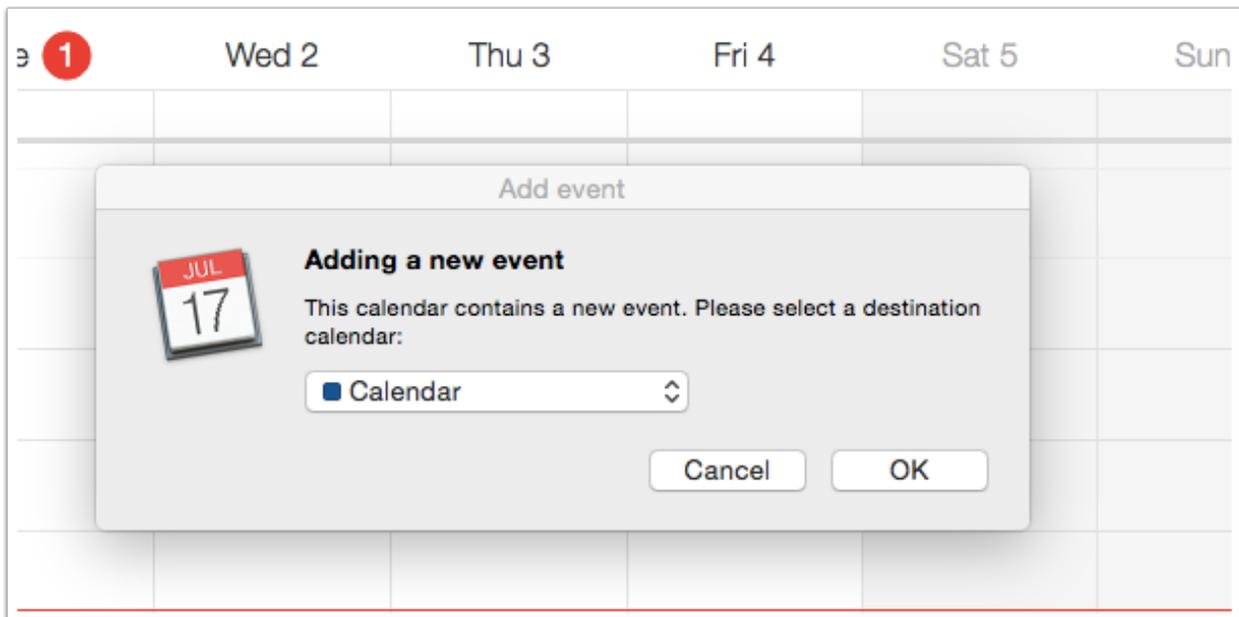


- Clicking the calendar icon in Internet Explorer will open a window at the bottom of your browser
- Click **Open**



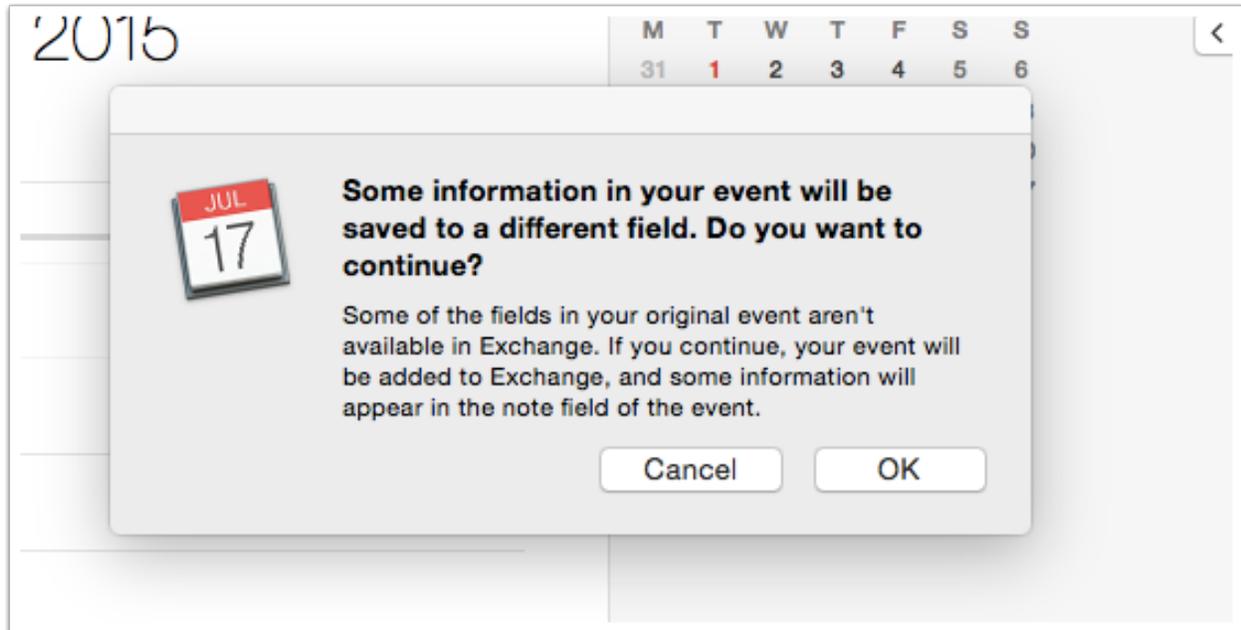
- The talk details open as an Outlook calendar item
- Click **Save & Close** to add the talk to your calendar

## Using Safari and Calendar (Mac)



- Clicking the calendar icon in Safari should open the Calendar app automatically

- You will be asked where you want to save your event - this can be your main Nexus calendar if you want
- If you choose to add the talk to your Nexus calendar, you may get this message



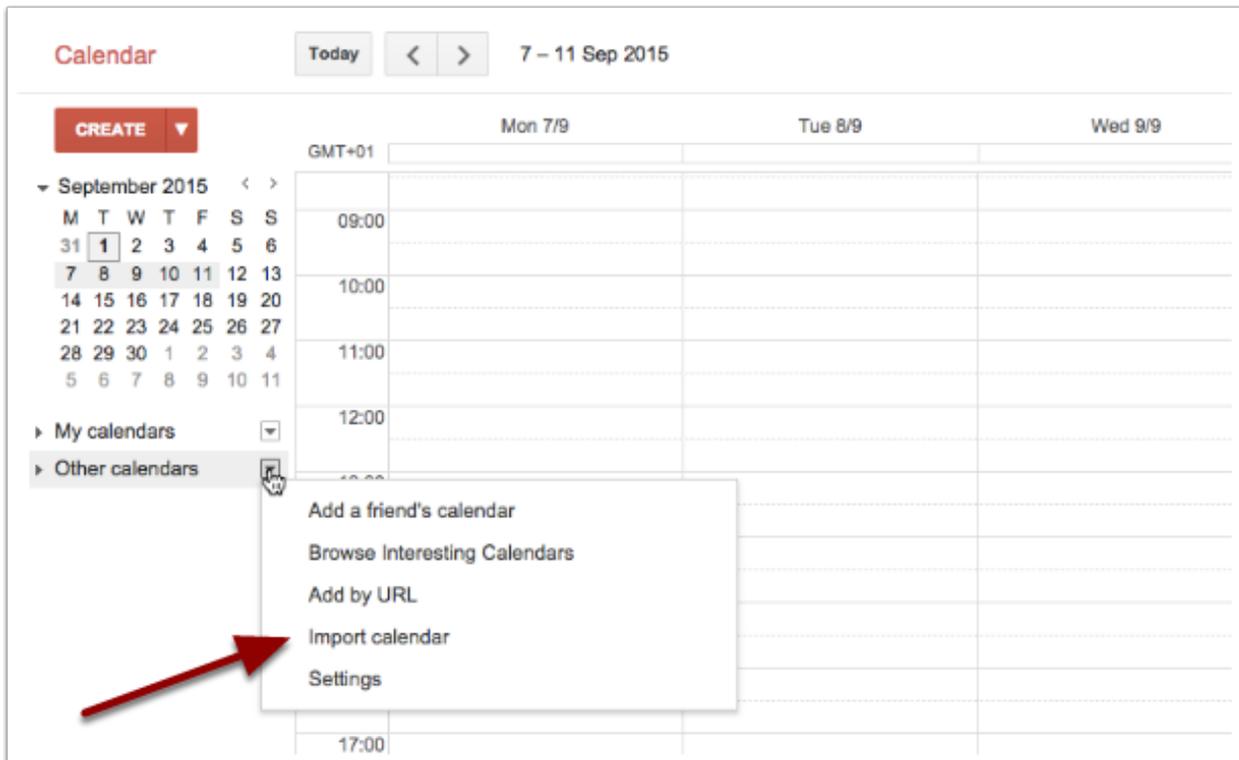
- Click OK and don't worry, this just refers to the link back to the original talk. It will be copied over to the event notes and will be clearly visible
- Your talk(s) will be added to your chosen calendar

## Using Chrome and Google Calendar

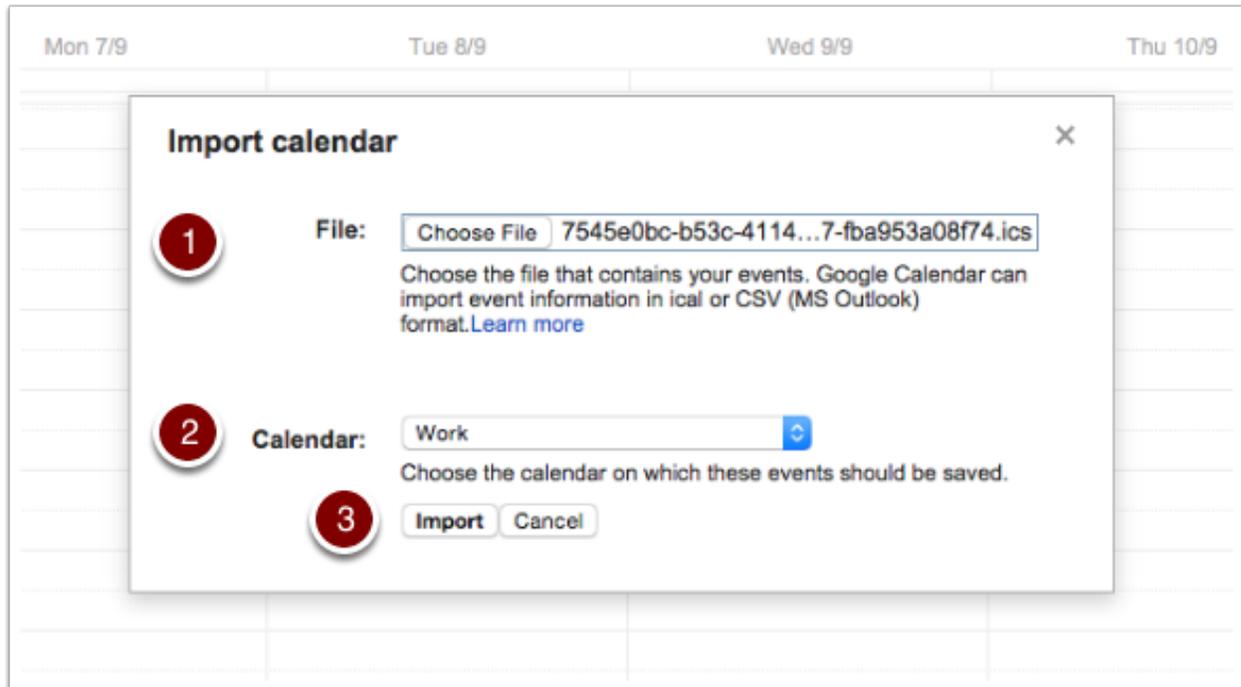
- Clicking on the calendar icon in Chrome will download a file to your computer - you can usually see this at the bottom of your browser.
- The filename will be a list of numbers, letters and dashes ending in '.ics' e.g: 7545e0bc-b53c-4114-b3b7-fba953a08f74.ics



- In Google Calendar, choose **Import calendar** from the options for **Other calendars**



1. Browse for the file you've just downloaded
2. Choose the calendar you want to import the file into
3. Click import to add your talk(s) to your chosen calendar

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## Get an up-to-date feed in your own calendar

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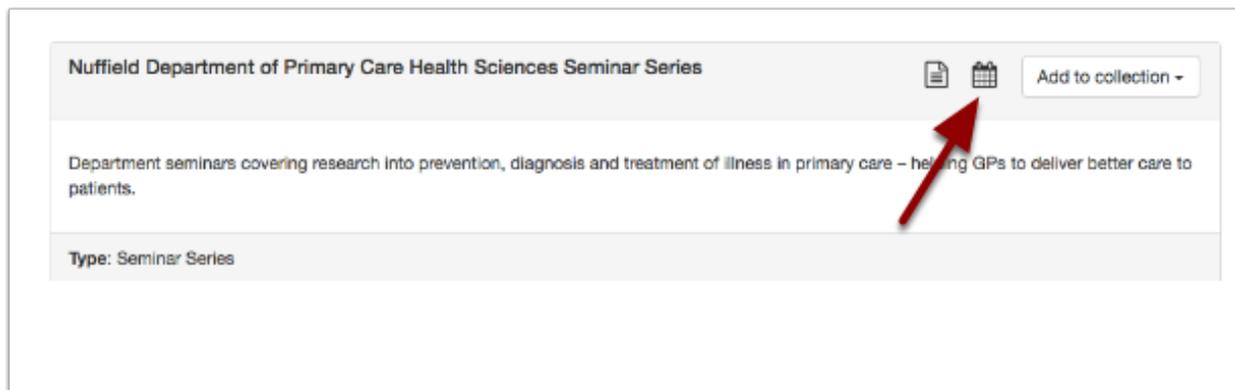
You can subscribe to a series or list of talks in your own calendar software. Subscribing means that the information is updated on a regular basis, so that you always have the latest information about the times and locations of talks.

**Note:** At present, it isn't possible to get the web version of Nexus calendar to subscribe to calendar feeds.

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### Get the feed URL

- Find the series you would like to subscribe to
- Right click on the **add to your calendar** button to copy the feed to URL to your clipboard (the **Copy Shortcut** or **Copy Link Address** option)

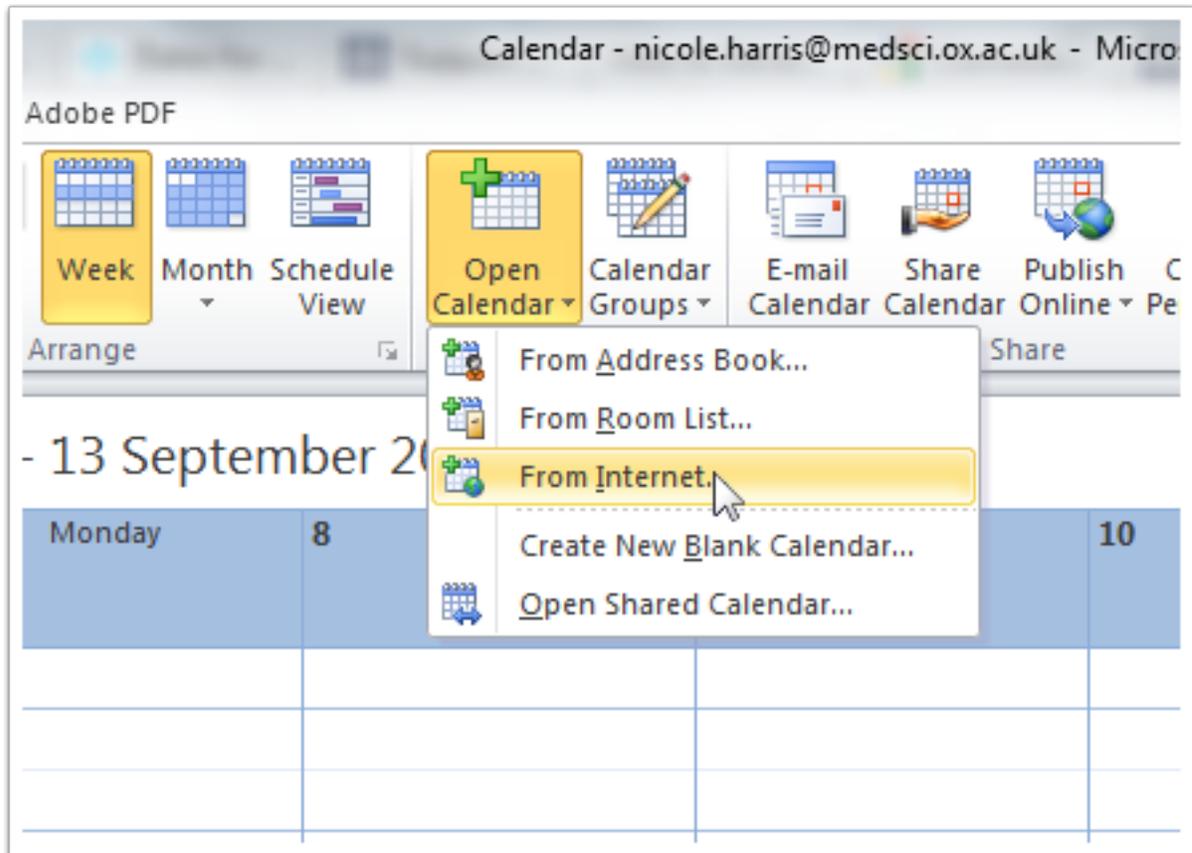


**Note:** When you come to paste the URL it should look something like this: <https://talks.ox.ac.uk/api/series/c70914d8-42c1-4ec9-a825-d7041570bdf9.ics> . The alphanumeric string is the unique identifier for the series, so this bit will be unique for each feed.

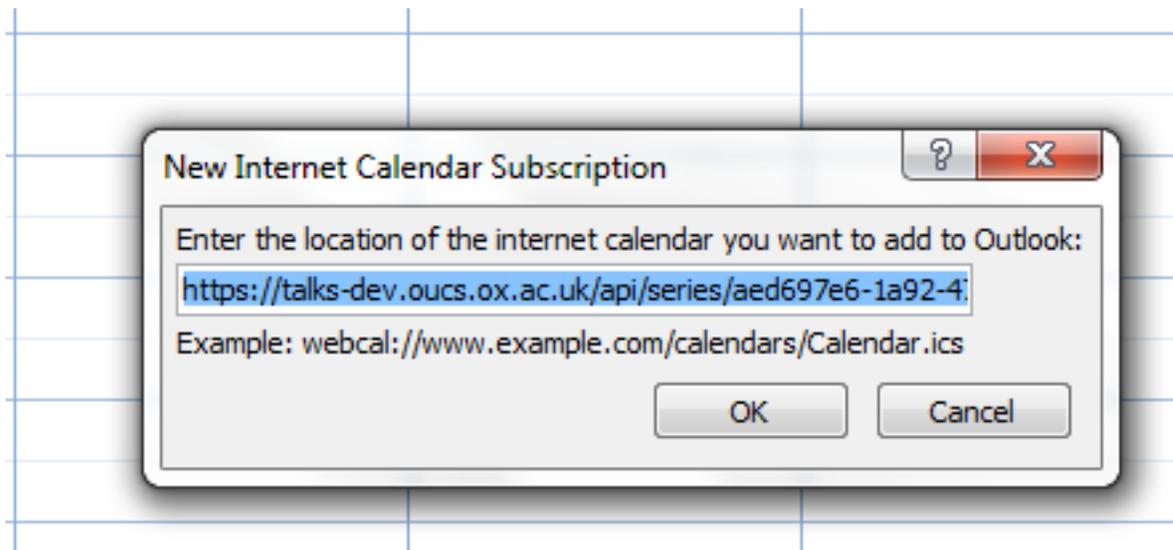
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### Outlook

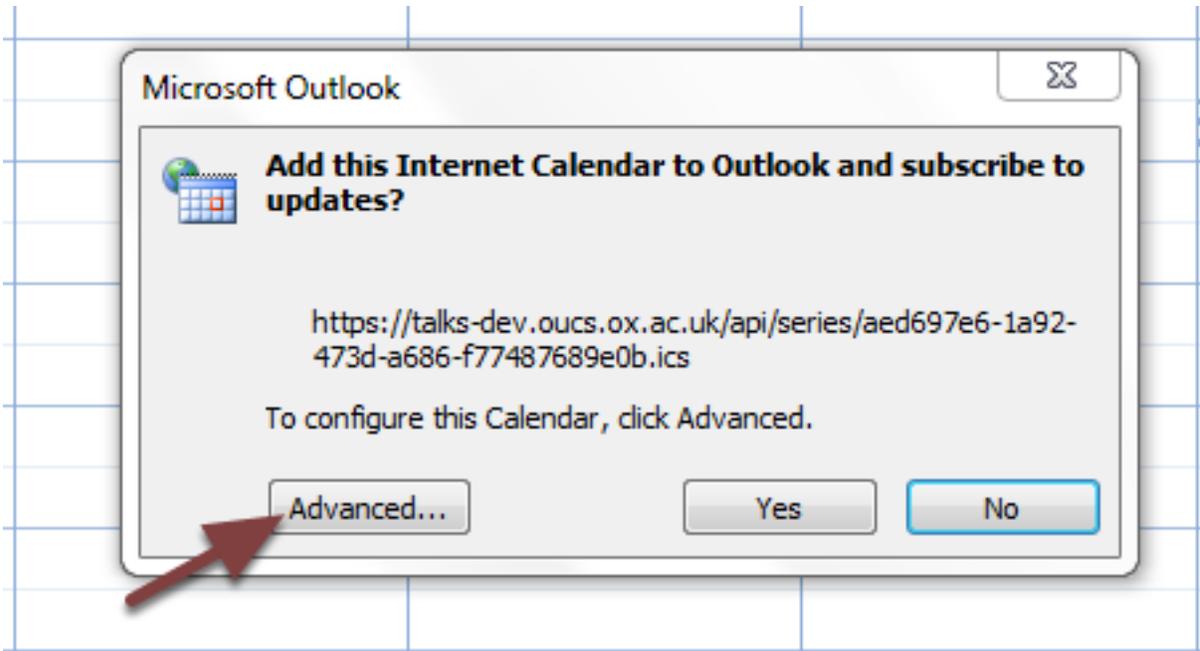
- After copying the URL, click **Open Calendar** and select **From Internet**



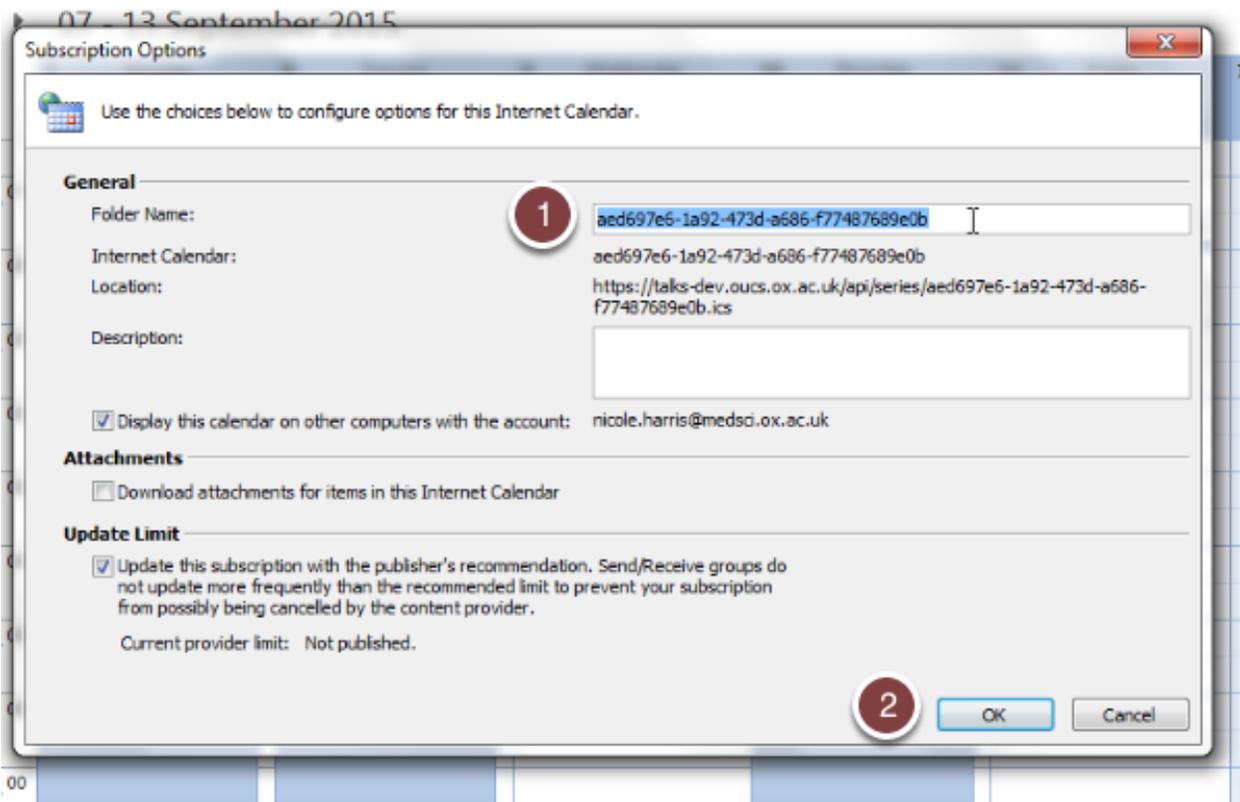
- Paste the URL into the **New Internet Calendar Subscription** box
- Click **OK**



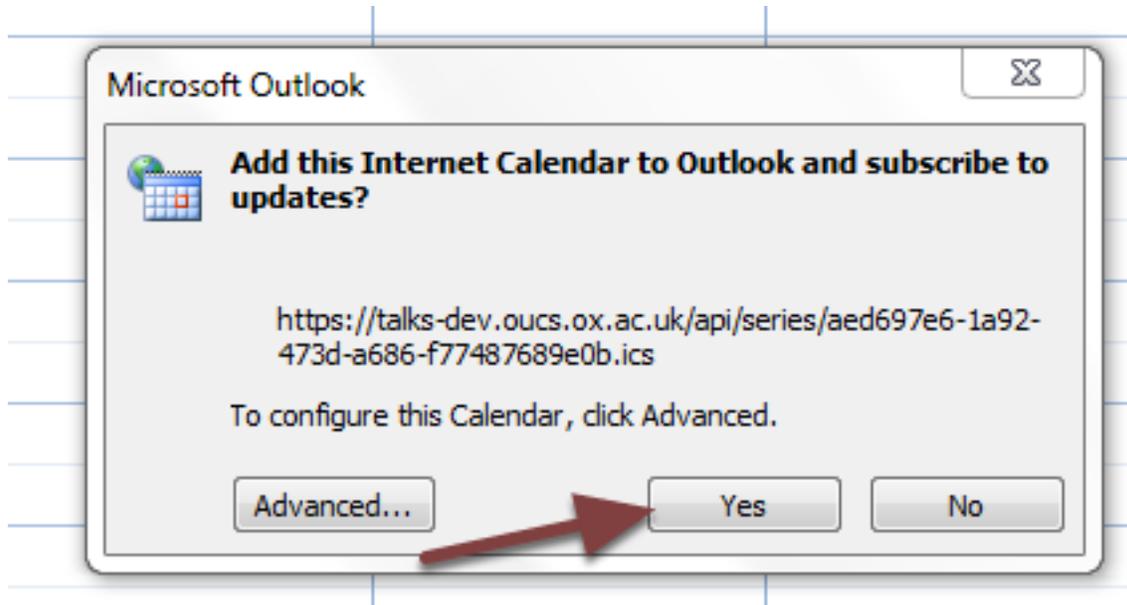
- The calendar takes the last part of the web address as its name (for example: aed697e6-1a92-473d-a686-f77487689e0b.ics)
- To change the name click **Advanced ...**



1. Type a new name for the calendar in the **Folder Name** box
2. Click **OK**



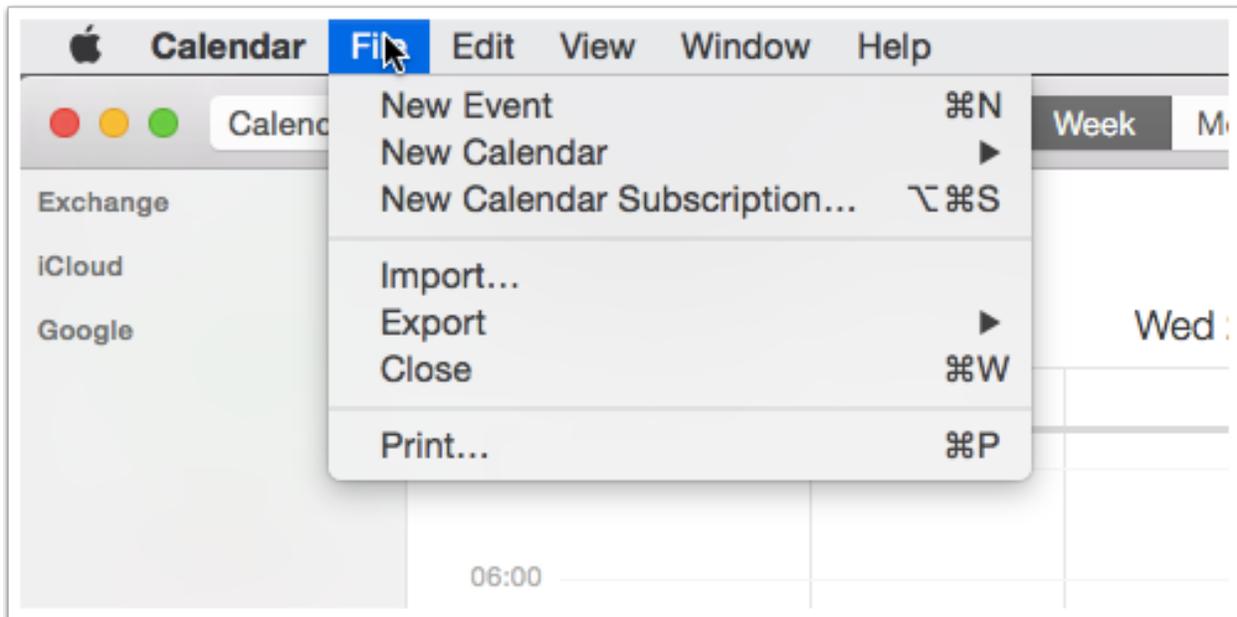
- Click **Yes**
- The calendar will open as a new calendar in Outlook



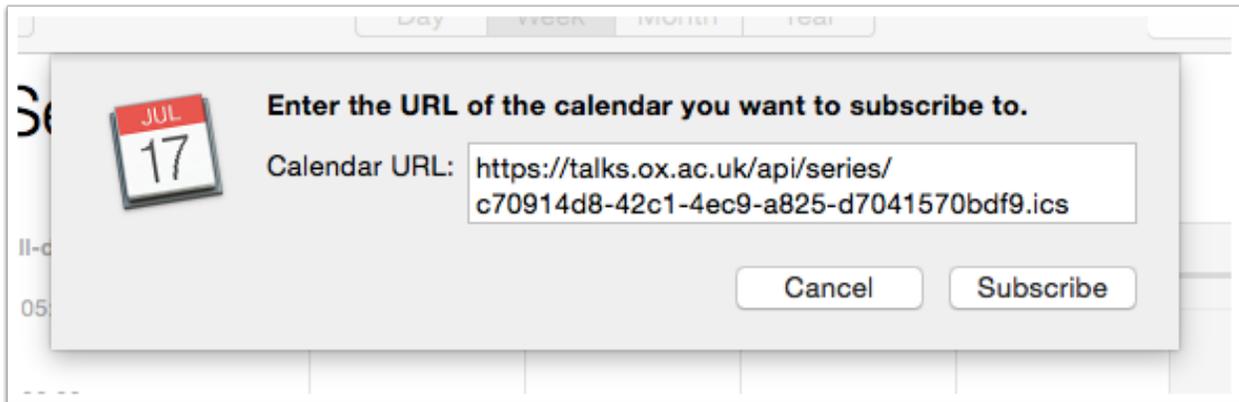
**Note:** You won't see this subscribed calendar on your web-based Nexus calendar

## Calendar (Mac)

- Copying the feed URL (see the first step in this tutorial)
- Click **File** in the top menu and then click **New Calendar Subscription**

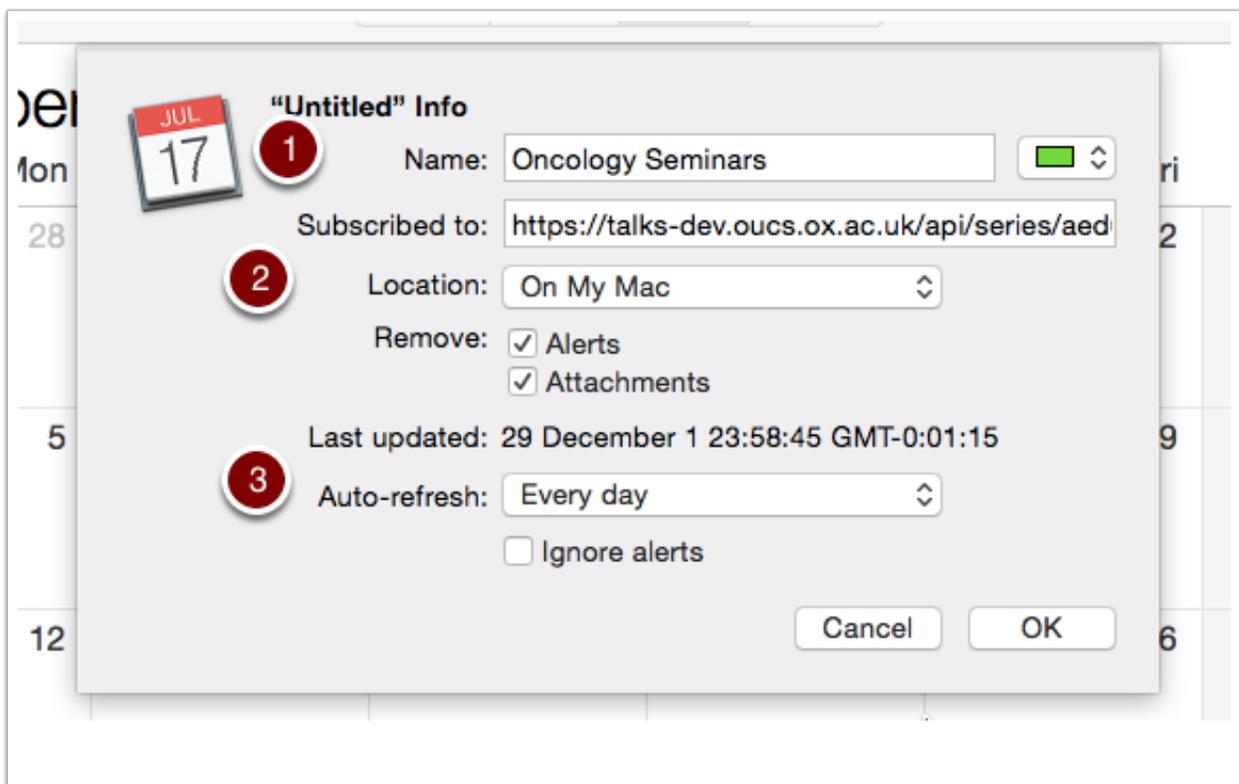


- Paste the feed URL into the box
- Click **Subscribe**

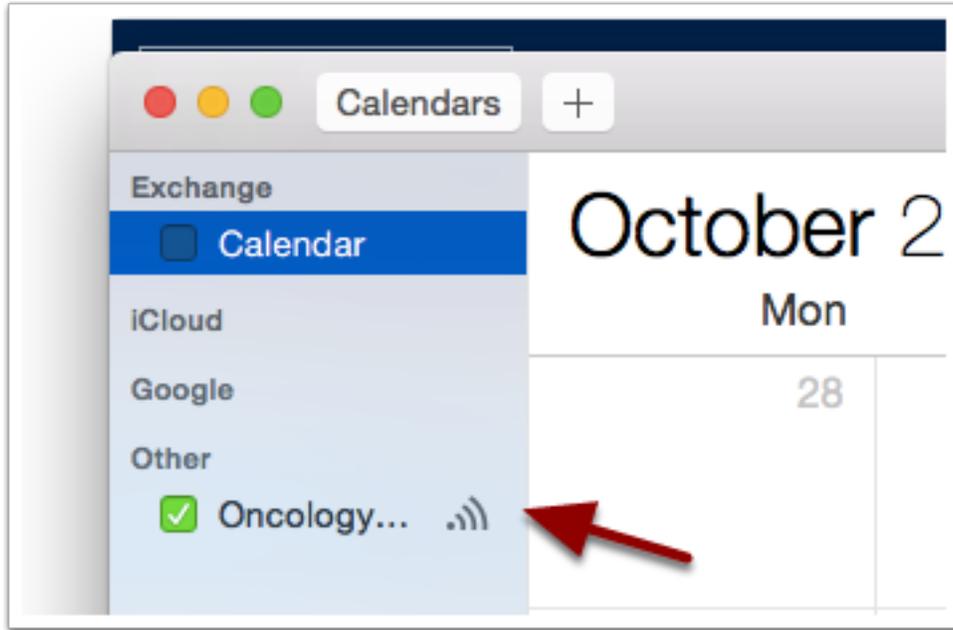


You will be asked to confirm the settings:

1. Give the calendar a meaningful **Name**
2. Choose *On My Mac* for the **Location** of the calendar
3. Set **Auto-refresh** to *Every day* (this should be enough to ensure the information is up-to-date, but be sure to check Oxford Talks as well)

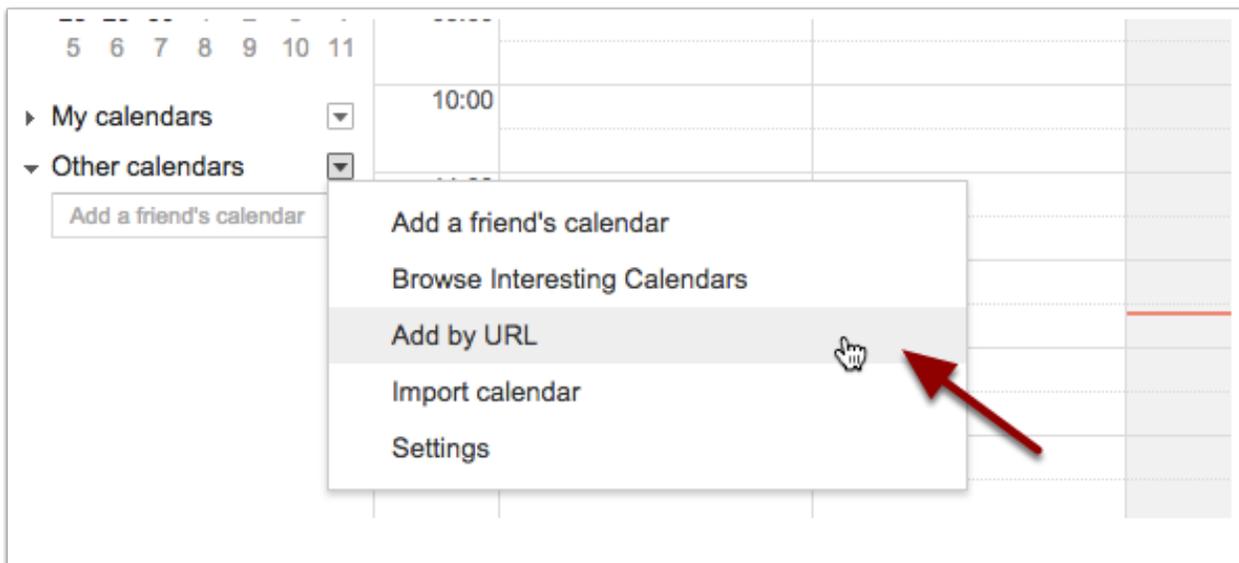


- The feed will now appear as a new calendar in your list under **Other**
- The little wireless symbol reminds you that it is a subscription to a calendar feed

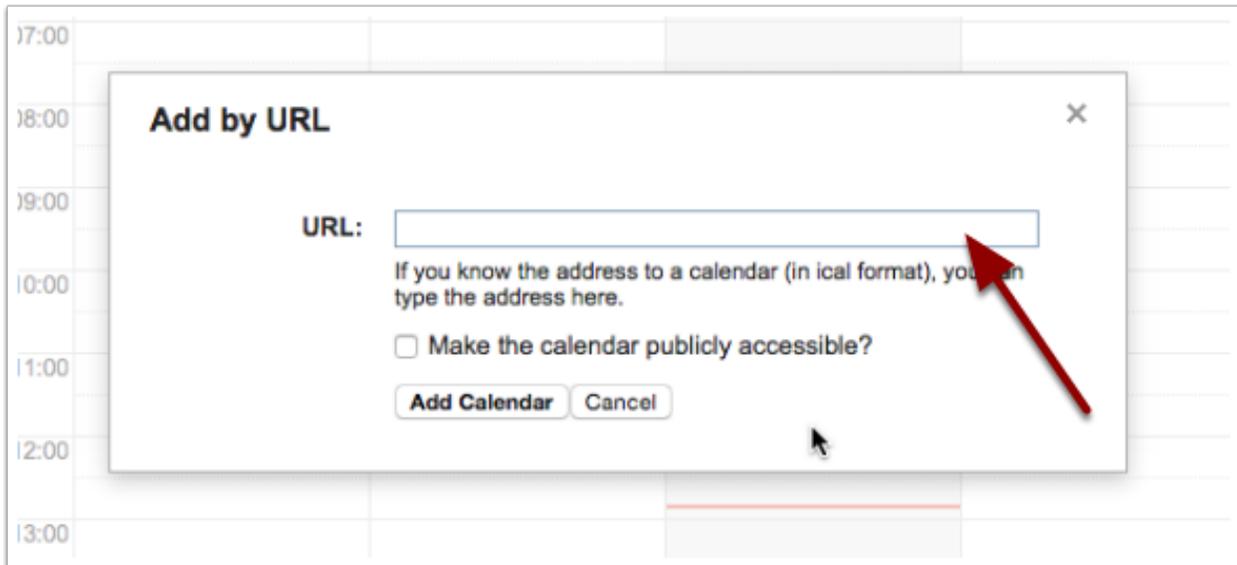


## Google Calendar

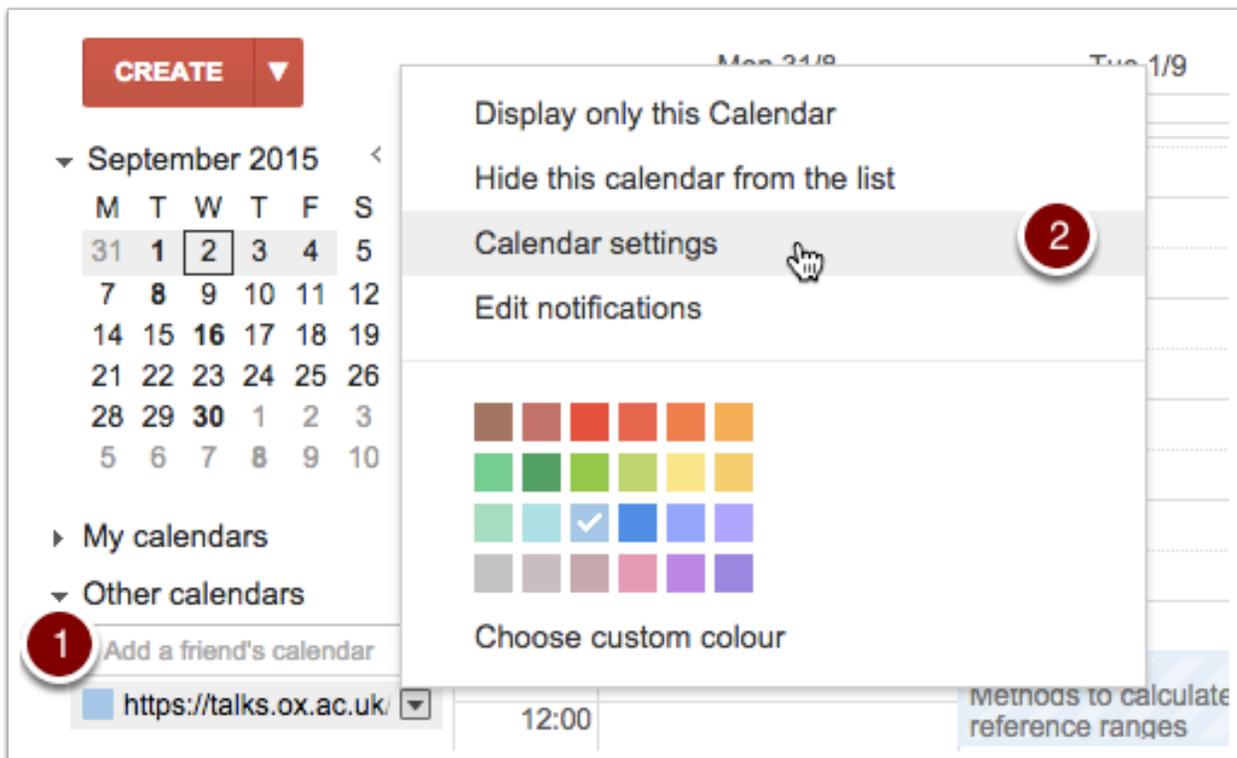
- Copy the feed URL (see the first step in this tutorial)
- Click the **Other calendars** drop down list
- Select **Add by URL**



- Paste the feed URL into the **URL** box
- Click **Add Calendar**



1. You will then find an additional calendar under **Other calendars** - events will appear on the calendar grid with a shaded background to indicate that they come from a feed
2. Click the calendar's drop-down list and select **Calendar settings** to change the name of the calendar to something more readable

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## Set up email reminders

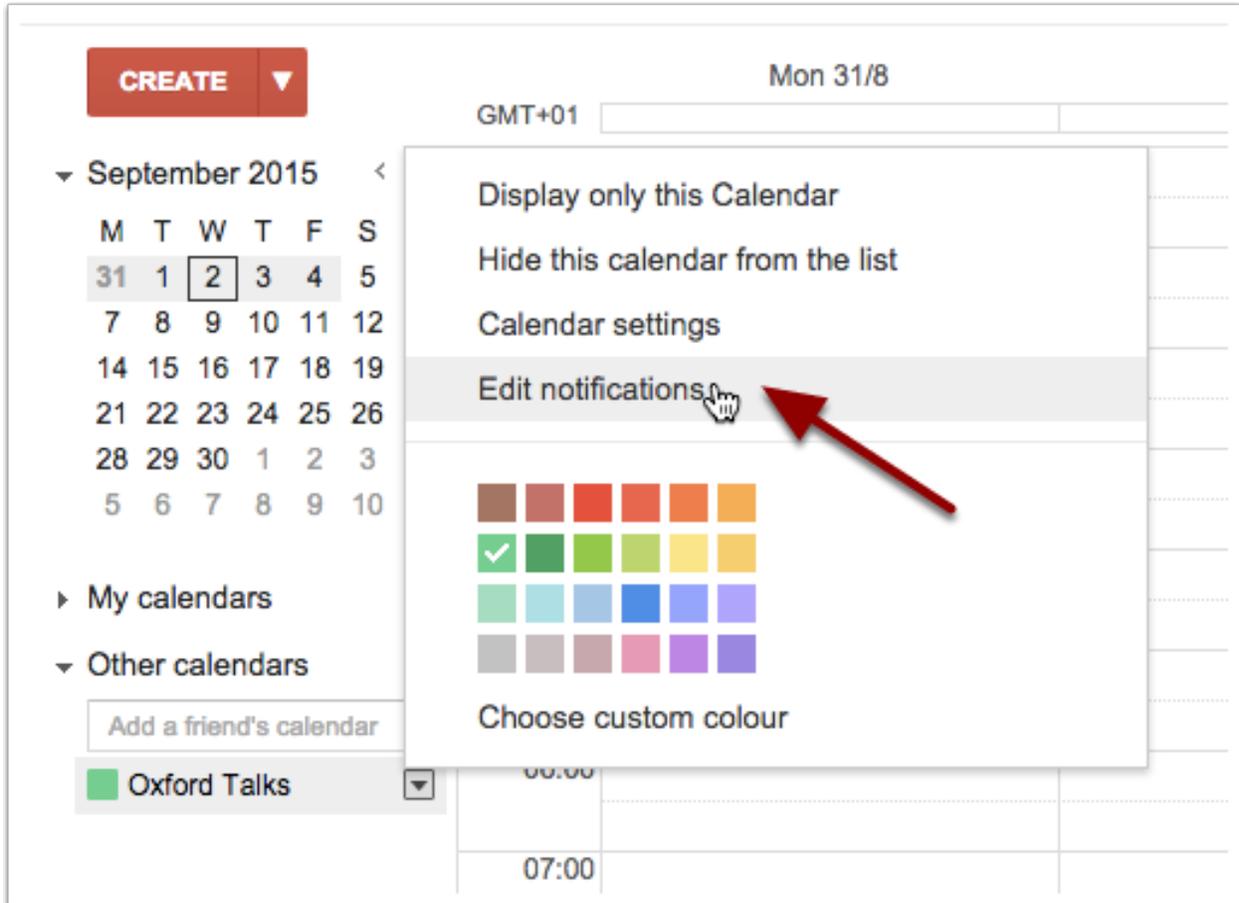
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Reminders and notifications by email are not yet available. Meanwhile, there are a few limited options to set up email reminders using your own calendar.

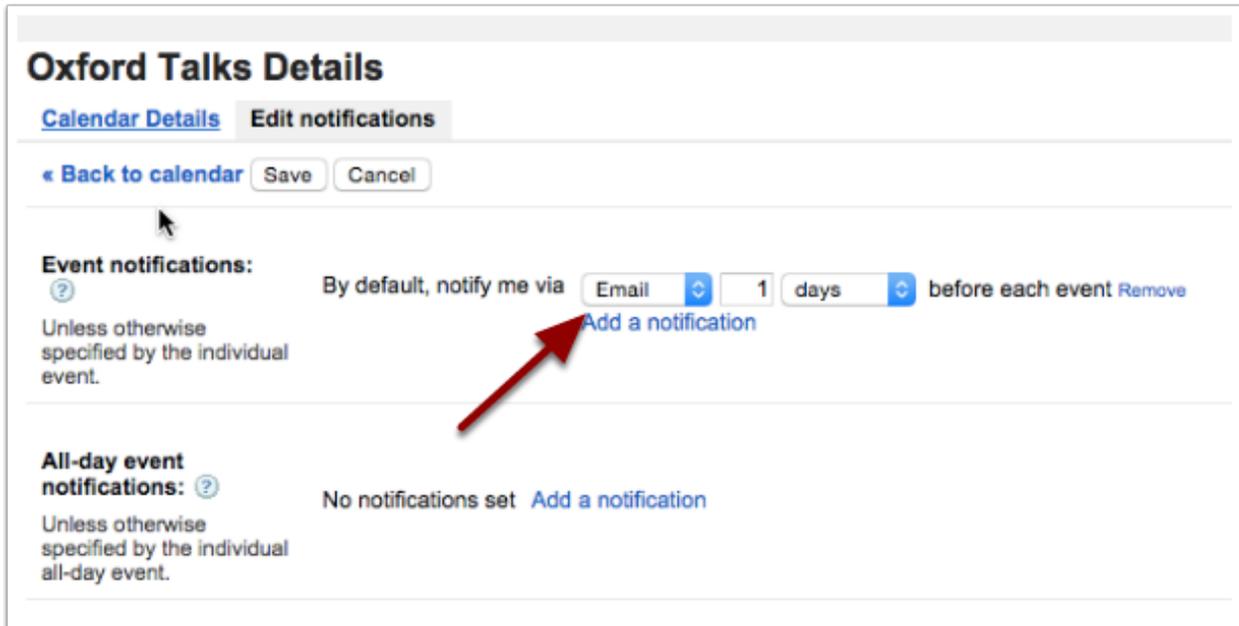
### Google Calendar

You can set up a default email reminder for any calendar feed. This will apply to all the talks in the feed. (see the [Get an up-to-date feed](#) section for more information on calendar feeds)

- Click on the drop down list next to the calendar created by the feed
- Choose **Edit notifications**



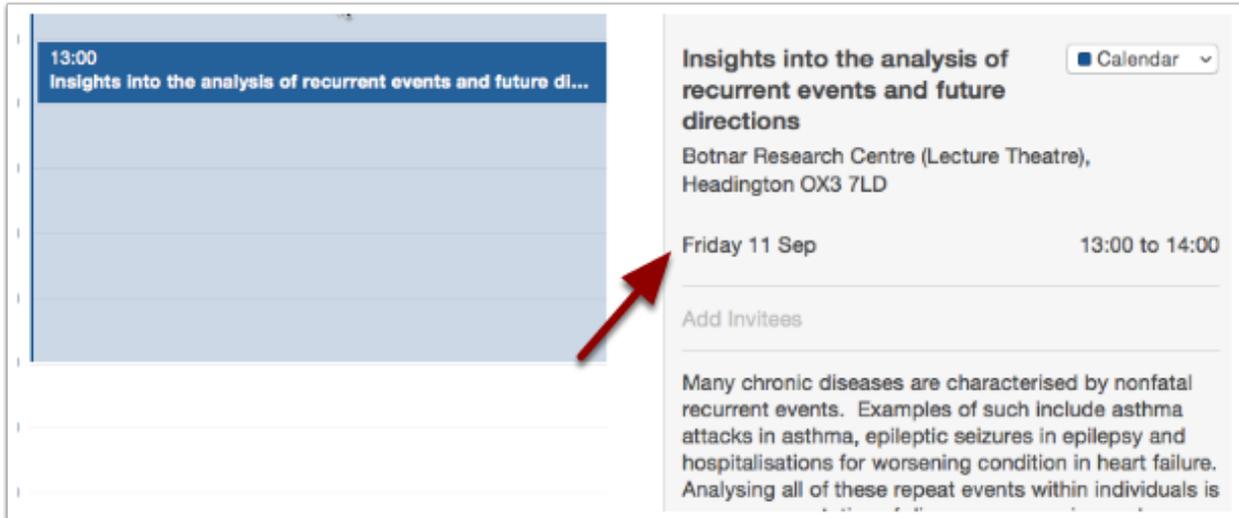
- Adjust the **Event notifications** to notify you by Email



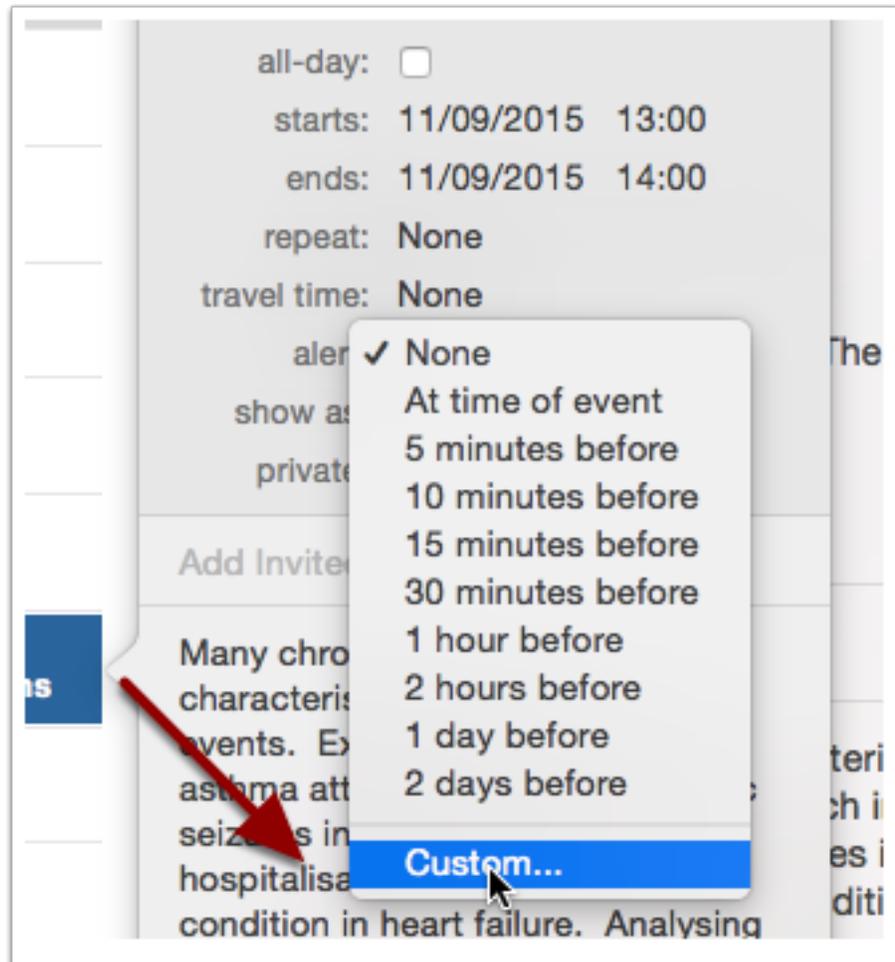
## Calendar (Mac)

You can set up an email reminder for individual events *copied* into your **Nexus** calendar, but not for calendar feeds. (see the [Copy talks](#) section for information about copying talks)

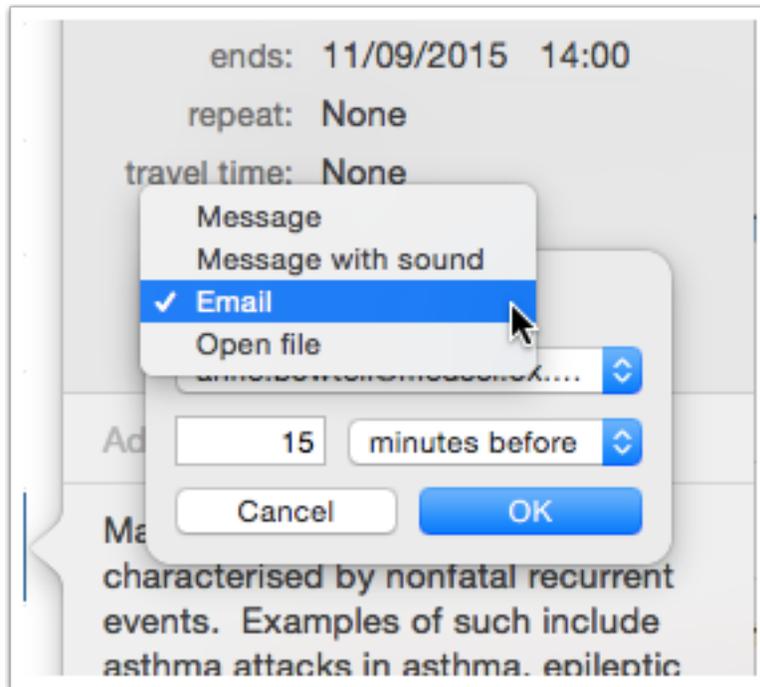
- Click on the date in an event display



- This will open up a panel to edit the date and other options
- Choose *Custom* from the **alert** options list



- Then choose *Email* in the pop-up box and set your email address and when you want to be reminded

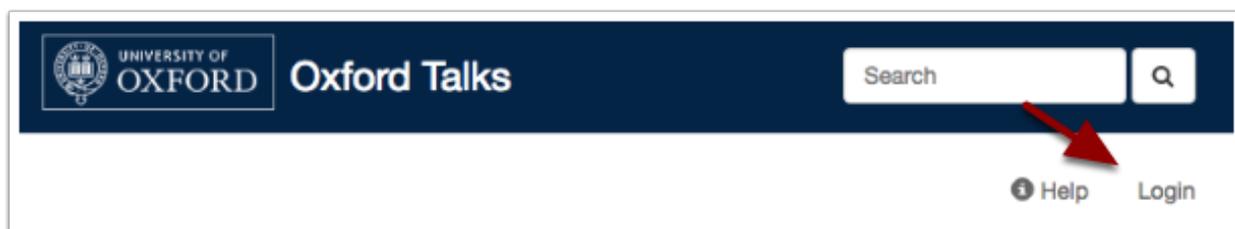
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## Logging in and out

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You can log in using your Oxford SSO username and password.

### Log in

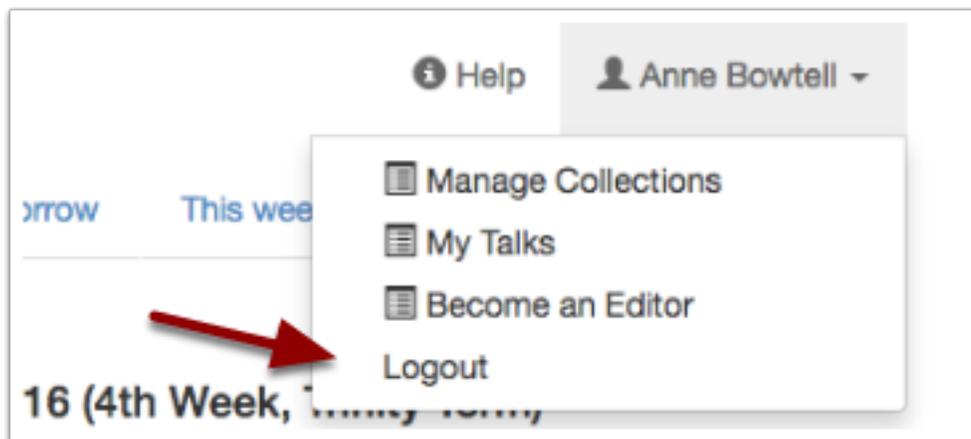


- The **Login** button is on the far right of the toolbar at the top of the screen
- Click **Login** and you will be taken to the usual WebAuth page to sign in
- Once you have signed in, clicking the **Continue to** button will take you back to Oxford Talks



**Note:** Just occasionally there are problems logging in with Internet Explorer. If you encounter this, close down your browser to log yourself out of everything, then open your browser again and try logging in to Oxford Talks.

## Log out



The **Logout** link is also located in the drop down list underneath your name at the top of the screen.

**Note:** Clicking this will only log you out of the Oxford Talks website. You will still be logged in to any other web pages you have logged in to with your Single Sign On username and password using the WebAuth page. If you really want to sign out of everything, then close down your browser.

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## Glossary of Terms used by Oxford Talks

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### Series

A Series is where a talk ‘belongs’ when you create it - for instance it may be part of a seminar series or a conference. We recommend that you only enter details about talks you organize yourself, like your Departmental Friday Seminars, or your Club meetings. You have to [be a Talks Editor](#) to be able to create a Series.

### Collection (List)

A Collection comprises talks owned and organized by other people, already added to Oxford Talks, and usually belonging to a variety of different series. For example, a collection of ‘Talks about Science and Art’ could include talks from the Department of Chemistry and the Department of History.

Note that it might not always be necessary to make a manual collection - talks can be assigned to the two categories below (Organising Department and Topic) allowing us to create automatic listings. You can also add an entire series or a department to a collection, if you do this then all talks belonging to that series or department will appear in the collection automatically.

Anyone with a University Single Sign On username and password can compile a Collection.

In an earlier version of the software Collections were called Lists.

### Organising Department

Many talks and series of talks are organized by a University department or unit. When a talk is added, it can be tagged with the department (or sub-unit within that department). This makes it simple to pull out all a department’s (or even a Division’s) talks.

### Topic

Although talks may be organized by a single department, they are often relevant to students and researchers in other departments right across the University. Tagging by Topic means that lists of talks on various subject areas can be pulled out automatically. We have used the Library of Congress Subject Headings for our topic choices, which means that the options for potential listings by topic are quite substantial - but if none of the available topics quite fits the bill, there is always the option to create a Collection.

## Talks Organiser

A Talks Organiser is the main point of contact for a talk or a series of talks. They are usually involved in setting up speakers, booking rooms and doing all the juggling involved in the day to day administration of seminars and lectures.

## Talks Editor

A Talks Editor is someone who has been given the rights to add and edit talks, and series of talks in Oxford Talks. You have to [apply to be a Talks Editor](#) (a relatively simple process). A Talks Editor is sometimes the same as the Talks Organiser - but not always.

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## Talks Editors and Talk Organisers

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### Talk and Series Organisers

#### Organisers

- are involved in the practical organisation of a talk or a series of talks
- are the main point of contact for enquiries about the event.

Organisers are added to Oxford Talks in the same way as speakers and hosts. If they don't appear in the drop down list as you type then you can use the Add Person button to add them quickly to the system.

Very often organisers will also be the people who add information about the talk to Oxford Talks - if that's the case then they will also need to be signed up as a Talks Editor.

### Talks Editors

#### Talks Editors

- have the rights to edit the information in Oxford Talks
- must have an Oxford University Single Sign On account and have applied to be a Talks Editor
- can create new series or talks
- can be added as an editor to other talks and series.

Once a Talks Editor has been signed up, you should be able to add them to the list of editors for a series or talk by typing their email address.

### Why the two roles?

The old Oxford Talks had just one role - the List Manager was the person who added and edited lists and talks and was also the point of contact for enquiries. Anyone could add or edit talks and lists.

When we designed the new system, feedback from administrators was that they would prefer editing and adding of talks to be restricted, so we created the Talks Editor role and put in the option to specify an organiser without having to go through the process of signing them up to be an Editor as well.



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## Latest Changes - May 2016

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We've just released a new version of the Oxford Talks software. Here are the main changes.

### Look and Feel

We've tidied up the look of the site to make it easier to find out what's coming up:

1. The home page has been redesigned - it should be quick to find what's going on this week and next by using the tabs across the top.
2. You *might* miss the personal listing - **My Talks** - at the bottom of the old home page. This is now on the drop down list under your username.
3. The talks should be easier to scan for interesting titles or speakers. Important information about the talk should be easily noticeable as well.
4. You can now browse departments and topics.

## Lists

Lists have been renamed **Collections** as we thought that this better reflected the way they work. It is just a name change - everything works in the same way as before.

You can now add a department to a collection. Good news if you want to create a collection of all the series in your department and also talks of interest from elsewhere on Oxford Talks.

## Date Picker

We've got a nicer date picker now for setting start and end dates. It is much easier to use.

## Speakers and Audience

1. Speakers should now appear in the order you've added them. It was going to be tricky to allow you to drag and drop speakers to get them into the right order, so if you add them in the wrong order then you'll have to remove them and add them again.
2. If you have too many speakers to list, we've allowed you to tick a box to indicate *Various Speakers*.
3. There's now a text box you can use to specify the type of audience, if *public* or *university only* are not sufficient.

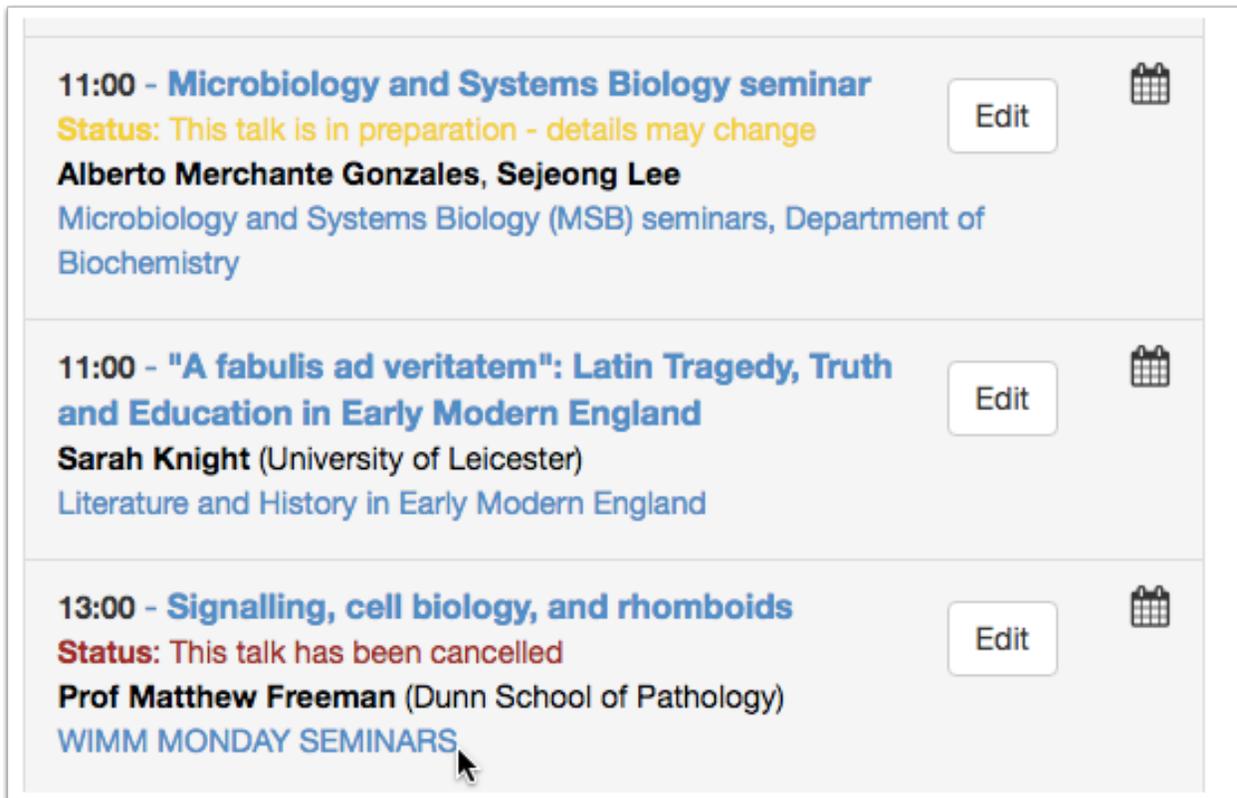
## Talks in Preparation

We've clarified talks 'in preparation'. Now a talk is automatically published when you create it, but you can switch it to 'in preparation' to let your attendees know that some details may change.

A key thing to note is that in preparation talks appear in ALL listings and are clearly flagged as 'in preparation'.

## Cancelled Talks

You can now also flag a talk as cancelled.

## Developers

There are one or two extras in the API now.

1. An important point - talks 'in preparation' (see above) are listed in the API output and are indicated as such with the **Status** field.
2. The from and to parameters work properly and there is also a time delta option e.g. (from=today&to=plus7)
3. As you can now add a department to a collection (see above), this should simplify requests.
4. We've added hosts, timezone information and .ics links to the output.

## Archiving old Talks

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The old Oxford Talks system is about to be closed down. Talks entered on that system **before February 2015** will be deleted.

If you would like to get a copy of your old talks:

1. Go to <http://old.talks.ox.ac.uk/index>
2. Find your list and note down its ID number
3. Type the following into the address bar of your browser substituting your list ID number for [ID number]

```
http://old.talks.ox.ac.uk/show/xml/[ID number]?start_time=0
```

or, for a table (but not quite so much information)

```
http://old.talks.ox.ac.uk/show/table/[ID number]?layout=empty&start_time=0
```

4. You can copy and paste the information on the resulting web page into Notepad or a similar plain text app.



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## Apply to be a Talks Editor

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To create Talks and Series (such as Seminar Series and Conferences), you need to apply to become a Talks Editor.

All members of the University are entitled to be a Talks Editor, if you are a student, please ask a member of staff to approve your application.

There are two steps:

1. [Log in](http://new.talks.ox.ac.uk) to Oxford Talks (this will create an ordinary user account for you) at <http://new.talks.ox.ac.uk>
2. Send an email to [oxtalks-contact@it.ox.ac.uk](mailto:oxtalks-contact@it.ox.ac.uk) with the following:
  - Your Name
  - Department
  - Your Email
  - Email address of the member of staff approving your application (if you are a student)

If you are planning to share editing with other colleagues then ask them to log in and send us their details as well.



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## Editor Responsibilities

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Please be aware that your talks will be advertised quite widely in the University.

They may, for instance, be included in weekly digests and be added to people's calendars. For this reason, please be sure to **keep your talk information up-to-date**.

### Accurate

Imagine how annoying it can be to cycle halfway across Oxford only to find that a talk has been rescheduled or the location has changed.

- Remember to [update Oxford Talks](#) when a talk's details change.
- When advertising a talk that isn't organized by you, remember to check the details regularly and, in the notes, tell the user where the most up-to-date information can be found.

### Complete

Very few people will make the effort to attend a seminar if they don't know the title or the speaker.

- Use the TBA option for titles and speakers so that people can 'save the date', but please remember to go back and change the details later.

### Easy to find

Bear in mind that users of Oxford Talks may well look for talks by typing keywords or topics into the search box, or by browsing by department or topic.

- Give your series and lists sensible titles
- Add an [abstract](#) or [short description](#), if you have it available
- Assign your talks to [topics](#) - it shouldn't take long and even a very generic term can be helpful



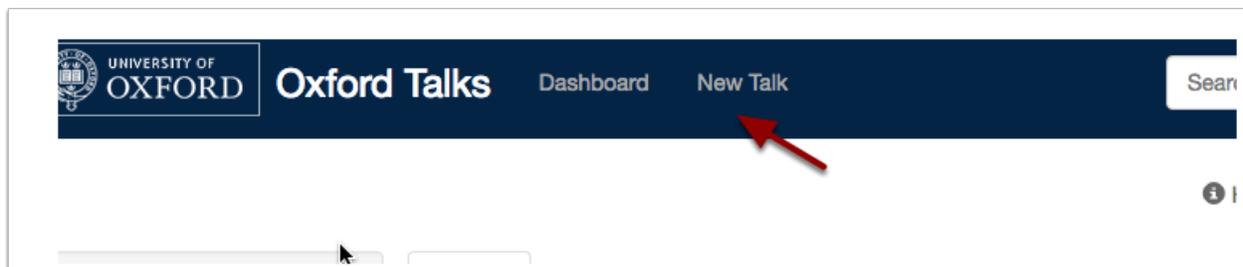
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## Create a talk

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Get started by creating a new talk.

### The New Talk form

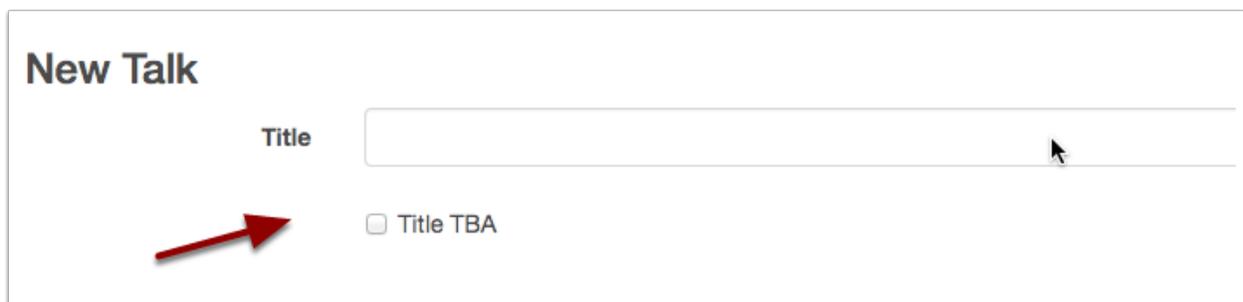


You can get to the New Talk form by clicking **New Talk** on the toolbar at the top of the screen.

Alternatively click **Dashboard** and then the **New Talk** button.

The New Talk form is quite lengthy, but the most important fields are grouped at the top:

### Title

Get started immediately by typing the **Title**.

If you don't yet know the title you can leave the **Title** field blank and tick the **Title TBA** box.

## Speakers

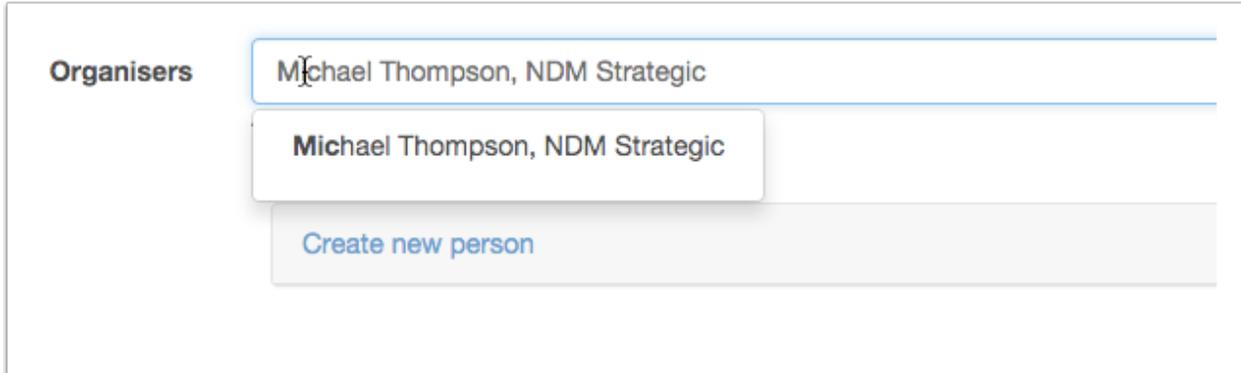

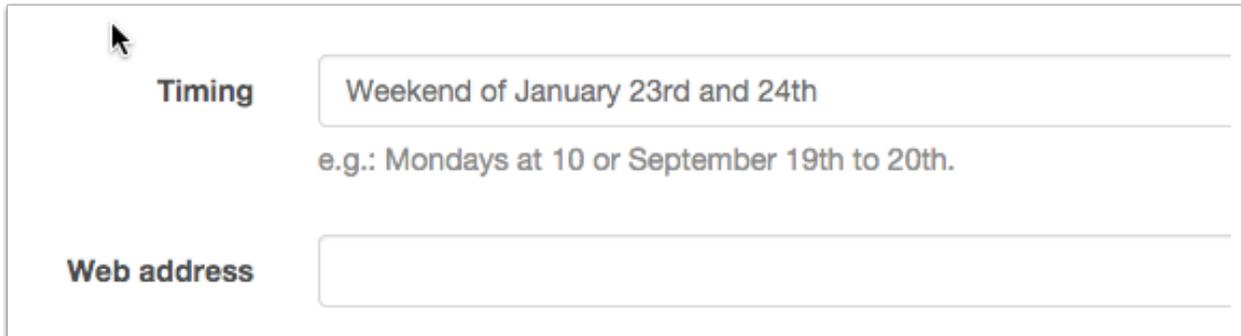

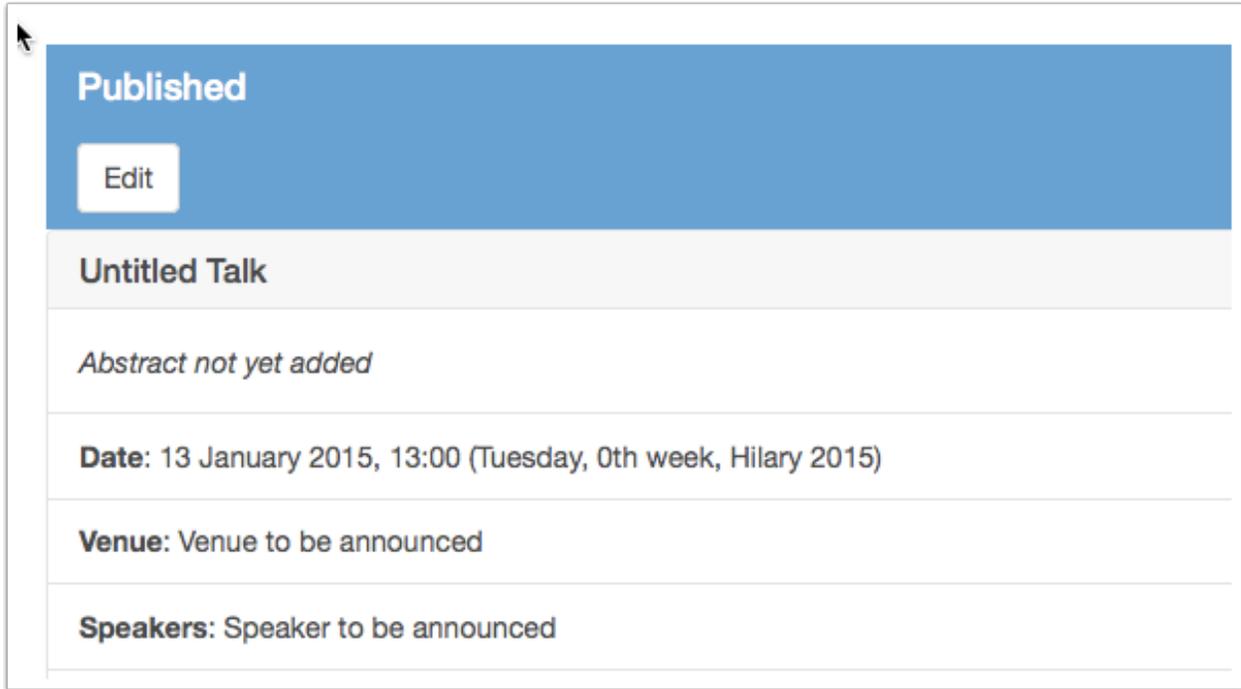

## Publishing

Talks are flagged as **Published** when you first create them. However, you may want to indicate that a talk's details are incomplete. In this case you can switch the talk's status to **In Preparation**.

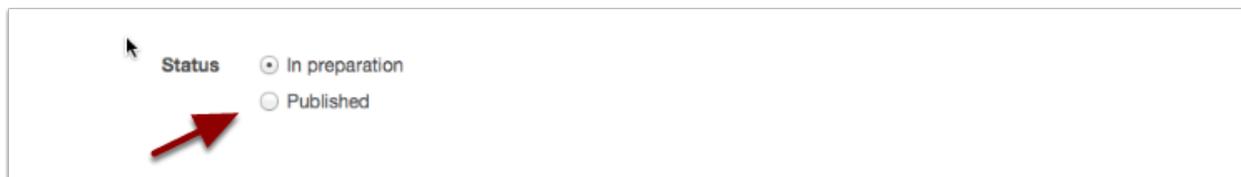

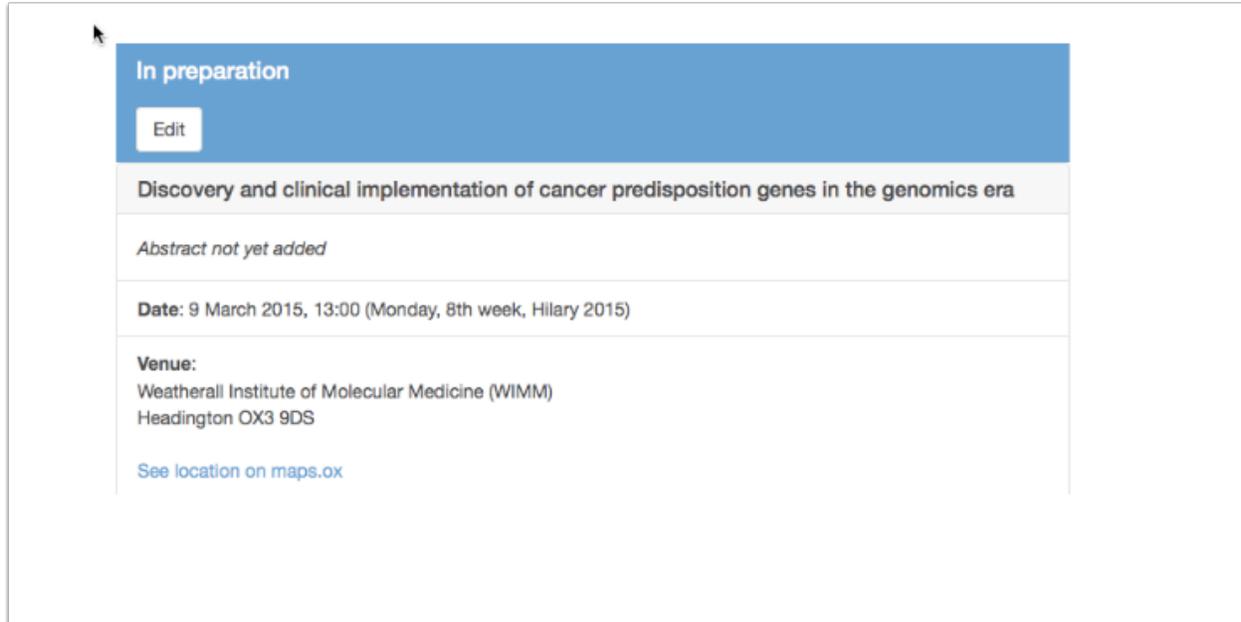

## Formatting text

### Formatting using the Textile markup language

Text in the Talk **Abstract** field and the Series **Description** field can be formatted using Textile markup.

The basics are very easy to remember:

A web address should convert into a link automatically when you save the talk. To give the link a title rather than just show the web address:

## Pasting from Word

You can copy and paste from Word, but you will need to format the text again.

If you have a number of abstracts and lots of formatting, then try:

- adjusting the styles in your Word document following the guidelines below
- saving your Word document as a plain text file
- opening the file in a plain text editor (e.g.: Notepad) and copying from there

### Headings

- Format > Style > Modify > Numbering ...
- Choose Numbering, click any numbering style and click the Customize ... button
- Set the Number style to None and type 'h1' in the Number format box

### Bullet Points

- Format > Bullets and Numbering
- Click the Customize ... button
- Select an asterisk from the Bullet Character options

### Numbered Lists

- Format > Bullets and Numbering
- Click the Customize ... button
- Set the Number style to None and type '#' in the Number format box

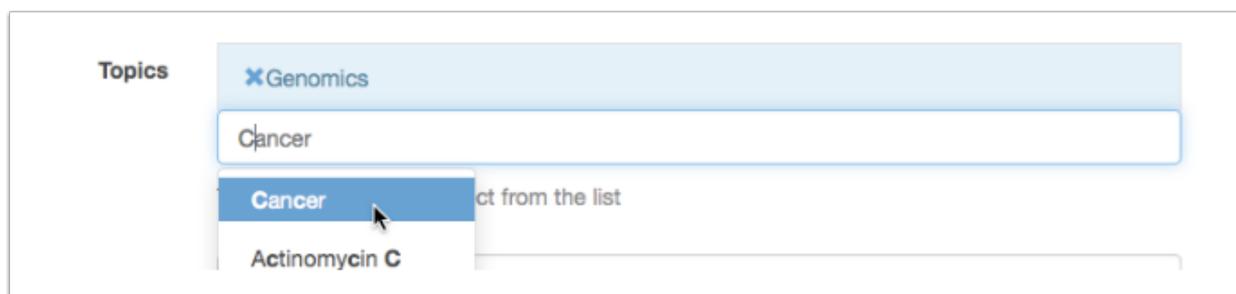

## Publicising your talk

---

Oxford Talks will automatically compile listings of talks in subject areas and can pull together all talks belonging to a department or a division. The more information you can give about a talk, the wider it will be publicised.

### Adding your talk to topic listings



We use Topics to group talks into subject areas. Assigning one or more topics to your talk will mean that it will have a better chance of being discovered and readvertised by specialist communities.

Go to the **Topics** field on the Add talk form. Start typing and you will be offered options from the [Library of Congress Subject Headings](#). Once you've found and selected a topic it will be highlighted in blue. To remove it, just click on the 'X'.

Please start with broader topics first e.g.: 'Neuroscience' or 'Ancient History', and then add narrower topics in the specialist area of the talk e.g.: 'Molecular Neurobiology' or 'Naval Warfare'.

### Viewing topic listings

To see a listing of talks for a specific topic, type the topic name into the site search box and then use the **Topic** filters on the left hand side of the results page. Alternatively, click on the topic name when viewing a talk.

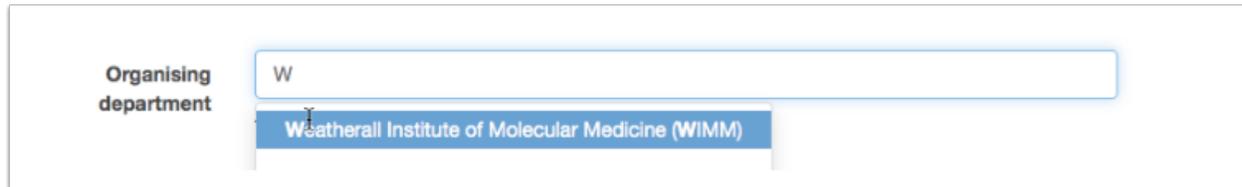

## Adding your talk to department listings

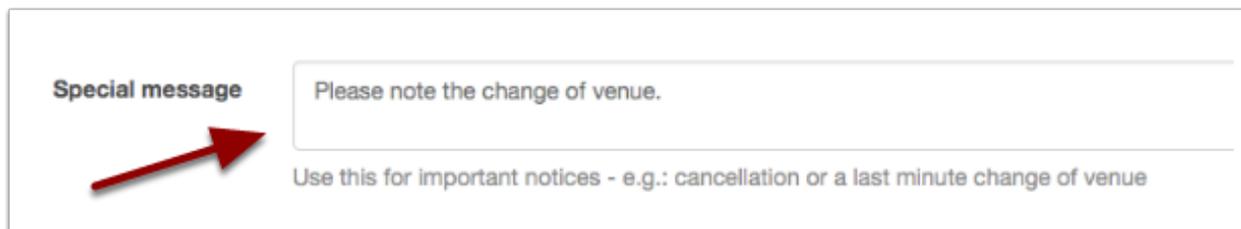

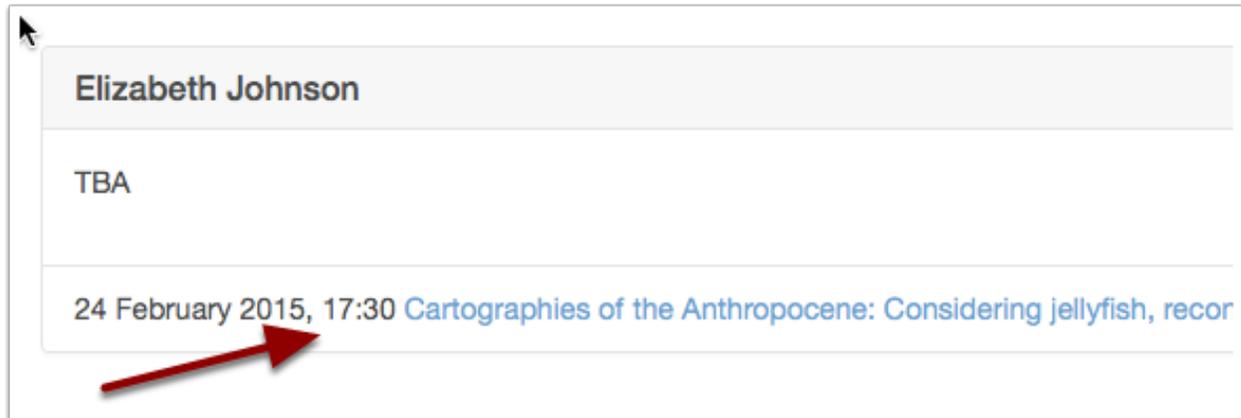

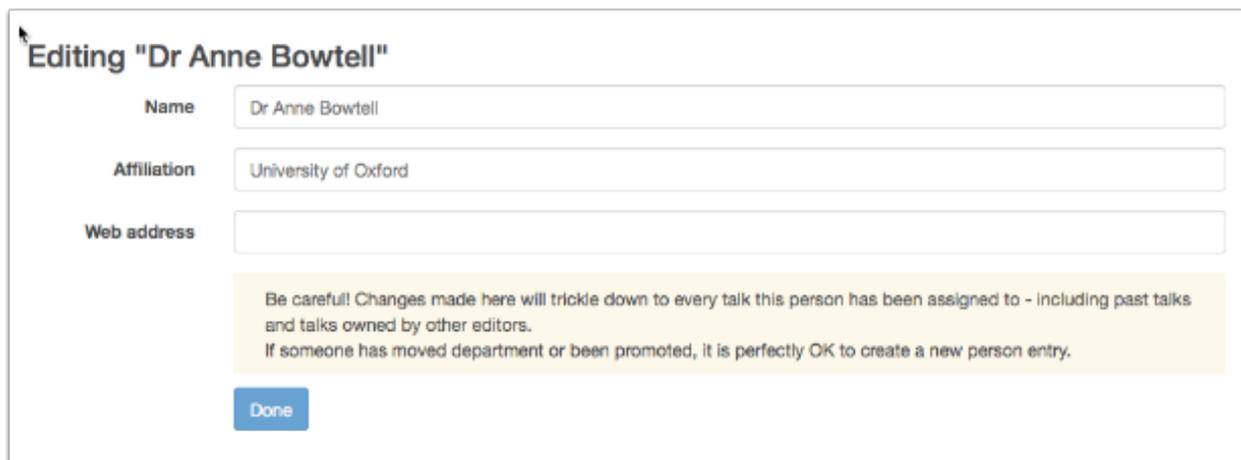

## Identifying suitable topics

The topics to assign to a talk or a series are drawn from the Library of Congress Subject Headings. This is a huge database and it is sometimes hard to find the right keywords. Here are some tips, if you are not sure what topics to use, or, if you can't find the appropriate topic for your subject.

### Ask a Librarian for advice

Your subject librarian should have a good idea of the appropriate LC Subject Headings for your particular subject area.

### Check the Libraries Catalogue for ideas

- Search **SOLO** for a key publication or author.
- Select a publication record.
- Choose **More bibliographic information** from the **Links** box on the right.
- LC Subject Headings are provided under **Subject - Lib.Cong.**
